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Engaging with Tolerance



Approximately 50 people attended the South East England faiths Forum annual conference and AGM on the 25th October at Newbold College in Binfield.

Abu Ahmed from the Home Office, Head of Communications and Engagement for Prevent spoke about the various forms of extremism

which are prevalent in the UK and abroad. He talked about the Prevent strategy and said the Government need to build trust with the various communities in the UK.

Naheem Bashir, Prevent Coordinator for Slough Borough Council said there was a need for dialogue and pathways forward. The prevent strategy has changed and looks at all forms of extremism and there is a perception of the strategy which is not reality, so this needs addressing.

Rabbi Jonathan from the Maidenhead Synagogue said things have changed from the past 20 years, there are a lot more mixed marriages for example, sports stars like Mo Salah have emerged and people of all faiths and none are among his fans. Rabbi Jonathan talked about intolerance from both other faiths and within faiths. He said the home is the place that can nourish and poison children and single faith schools don't allow children as well as parents to mix and have open communication.

Hari Parekh spoke about his experience as an apostate (formerly Hindu, now Humanist) and the intolerance people can be faced with if they choose to leave their faith.

Sarbjit Athwal from True Honour spoke about the horrific ordeal she went through when her sister in law was murdered for 'honour', how the police responded and although new law has come into force, there is still a need for creating awareness around the issue of honour based violence.

Alison Webster, author of 'Found out—Transgressive faith and sexuality' spoke about the intolerances faced by homosexuals. She said religions should honour the individuals experience and not violate the individual by not allowing them to be who they want to be. She said faith communities have denied who we are and failed us.

The conference was ably chaired by Mrs Margaret Lenton, former Head Teacher, Magistrate and former Mayoress of Windsor and Maidenhead.

Refugee Support



The Communities Engagement Team (CET) from the Diocese of Guildford organised a Refugee conference to learn from the experiences and testimonies of various people nationally and in Surrey. Approximately 100 people attended the conference at St saviours Church in Guildford on Monday 5th November.

Speakers included Maurice Wren, CEO of Refugee Council who gave a national overview, Sarah Black from Guildford Borough Council, who gave a local overview: involvement in the Syrian resettlement programme, Bekele Woyecha from Citizens UK who spoke about Community Sponsorship, Maggie Hamilton from St Bartholomew's

Church, Haslemere who gave a parish experience, Gill Cox, a volunteer who is supporting some refugee families with learning English and Jonathan Cullen who shared a detainee's Tale from Refugee Tales. A video clip of testimonies from young refugees was played during the conference, which gave insight to the sensitivities, challenges and hopes of young refugees.

Jo Cookes, Director of CET said 'the event involved a breadth of experience and expertise being shared; and there was a real buzz in the room. It was a great opportunity for us all to come together to celebrate what has been achieved but also to acknowledge all that is still to be done to welcome and support refugees and

asylum seekers to resettle here in Surrey and the rest of the UK. To hear from those working nationally through to those supporting refugees on a 1:1 basis, as well as hearing the voice of those who are not often heard was incredibly powerful and thought provoking.'

Jo Cooke, concluded with some steps that should be taken following the conference, which included:

- Houses are in short supply in this area and refugees can only be received if we can find privately owned and managed houses. It would be good to raise awareness of this. If you are aware of any houses, or of people who may have houses, please get in touch with diane.peters@cofeildford.org.uk

Camberley holds Multi-Faith Peace Vigil

On Saturday afternoon a group of Camberley's community gathered in response to the recent terror attack at the synagogue in Pittsburgh, USA, in which eleven people lost their lives. They were joined by passers-by interested in their message of peace and hope for a better future.

The vigil, organised by Surrey Heath Faith Forum, which took place on 10th November on Park Street Camberley, demonstrated their solidarity in condemning terrorism, and in offering an opportunity to remember those who had died. It also gave thanks for those who responded so quickly to the needs of the victims, and highlighted the importance of community cohesion in the wake of the attacks.

Members of each of five faith traditions spoke words of peace.

Sending out a strong message of public unity, Revd Susan Bolen of St Peter's Church Frimley read a statement of peace written by Surrey Heath Faith Forum. It included the following:

"We stand together today as residents of Surrey Heath and members of this community, having been deeply affected and saddened by the horrific act of violence that took place at the Tree of Life Synagogue in Pittsburgh, USA."

"Despite our differences we are one humanity and each of us desires to live in a world which knows peace, hope and love."

At the end of the ceremony Ray Wicksman added: "Today we have stood up for peace and unity. Now we leave with a shared determination to live this out in our own lives."

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Woking Debate: Brexit

Brexit: Have your say was the title of the Woking debate held on Saturday 10 November. On the day after the other Johnson, Jo, resigned from the cabinet on The Brexit deal the debate was held at a crucial time in the negotiations and for our country reaching a decision. Approximately 50 people attended and this was a good debate with robust views expressed and everyone listening attentively to different viewpoints.

The Chair opened the debate with a summary of where we are now.

It was said that the language used in the Brexit discussion was terrible. There had been no proper discussion on the issues and no clear reasons had been presented for coming out of the EU or what the future would be like if we came out of the EU during the Referendum. It was suggested that the press had been largely for coming out and has been consistently anti Europe and pro US. The emphasis on the US mid term elections has been significantly greater than on the French elections. Why? Who would you want to go out for a meal with, Trump or Barnier? Woking voted 56% to stay in and 44% to come out.

As a smaller unit we will be in a weaker negotiating position than the EU. Germany alone exports three times as much to China than the UK. We have not had any trade negotiators since joining Europe in 1973. Are we able to negotiate good deals? Does the US really care about us enough to give us a good deal? Cameron was to blame for not preparing for a Leave vote.

MP, Jonathan Lord said the next four months will be crucial. The Withdrawal Act that has been passed by Parliament commits the UK to leave the EU in March whether there has been a deal agreed or not. The prospects for a second referendum are very low. The PM and the Government would have to agree to it and they have ruled it out. The original leaflet explaining the basis of the Referendum had committed the Government to implement the decision of the people in that vote.

On the benefits of leaving Jonathan spoke strongly about sovereignty. When we voted to join it was to join a trading agreement, now it has become increasingly a political union. He foresaw tangible benefits from leaving in fisheries, agriculture and opening up to trade from the Third World.

Someone working in financial services said leaving the EU would just add another tier of standards to the industry and they would still need to keep the EU's standards to trade there.

A psychologist predicted a major increase in psychological problems and asked how people can help build community cohesion at this difficult time.





Police offer Counter Terrorism training for staff and volunteers working at places of worship

Counter Terrorism Police are calling on places of worship to take part in an innovative new training

scheme that is proving a hit with major shopping and entertainment venues.

The package – free to use and developed in partnership with retail giant Marks & Spencer – aims to equip workers in crowded places with knowledge to help prevent terror attacks

Called ACT Awareness e-Learning, the training covers how to spot the signs of suspicious behaviour and what to do if a major incident should take place. Free to use, the package can be divided into short sections to suit business or service needs. However, it takes just three quarters of an hour to complete – 45 vital minutes that could save lives

Last year 36 people were killed and many more were injured in five separate incidents in London and Manchester. One of the attacks involved a group of worshipers outside a mosque. One man lost his life and many others were injured.

Police are now asking leaders of all faith institutions – especially those who host large congregations – to encourage staff and volunteers to take part.
