Pastoral Letter 56 12.5.21

Dear friends,

What a difference a little sunshine makes! I am writing this after the sleet and snow in April is beginning to meet its match with the sun and warmer temperatures. Beautiful sight to see! These days are still challenging enough without adding a winter like rain and wind at the beginning of May. However, amid that there is much beauty for us to enjoy and give thanks to God with joyful hearts. I guess that is what I want to touch on in this letter – finding beauty in the midst of storm, light in the struggle, perspective in the challenge. In a conversation with a friend he mentioned a quote, very simple but deep in meaning. "It does not matter if the glass is half empty or half full as long as it can be refilled."

These last thirteen months have been full of reasons for us to get discouraged, see the worst and dwell on the losses. But if we are honest, there have been many blessings during the very real struggle. We are not out of the pandemic yet and we have much before us.
