We're at the time of year when, in some sports, issues of promotion, relegation and qualification have become very serious concerns. Nagging fears and fragile hopes have become reality. In other sports the same kind of hopes and fears are considerations

How is it that a team of highly talented individuals can do anything other than win and succeed? How is it that such a team can lack unity of purpose and cohesion and fail? Yet, every year, there are mystifying examples of failure where there should have been success. May we be as one, a real team, playing life for each other, for others and for Jesus Christ. As the celebration of Pentecost comes towards

us may we be moved to hear afresh, to feel anew, the encouraging, the urging power and words of the Holy Spirit.
