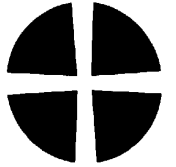
**From the Editor**



### **DISTRICT SYNOD: APRIL 2016**

The Spring Synod was a good mix of business and an opportunity to discuss issues which are of importance to each of us concerning our relationships with others. The important piece of business for us from Woking & Walton circuit was the full agreement by Synod to recommend to the Conference (in June) that the Guildford and Woking and Walton-on-Thames Circuit combine to form a new Circuit called the Wey Valley Circuit from 1<sup>st</sup> September 2016.

Synod commenced with worship which included the presentation and testimony of Ordinands. It was both a privilege and moving to hear the testimonies of two probationer presbyters and a deacon, all of whom will be ordained at this coming Conference. We are particularly supportive of Paul Tabraham, who was formerly at Trinity.

Other items of business concerned the presentation of the District accounts, a report from the District Safeguarding Officer and accepting written reports from other committees of the District. Two Superintendents in the District proposed a memorial be sent to the 2016 Conference asking for a review of the current stationing process for presbyters. After some debate over the wording, it was agreed by a large majority that the District asks Conference to explore ways of demonstrating the church's continuing commitment to itinerant ministry and to explore ways of reducing stationing pressure.

Two short presentations were given, one of which was by Revd Claire Hargreaves on behalf of All We Can about the plight of the Syrian refugees in Jordan.

Considerable time was given at Synod for discussion around issues of marriage and relationships. Within the Church, people have many views about human relationships and the nature and purpose of marriage. A major change to the law in 2014 enabled the introduction of same-sex civil marriage. Churches and other religious groups were given the legal option to opt-in to conduct weddings for same-sex partners.

## A Big Thank you.

You will all be aware that the Woking & Walton-on-Thames Circuit is in the last three months of its incarnation. The Circuit Leadership Team, in conjunction with the Guildford Leadership team, are busy undertaking the final tasks which will position us to become The Wey Valley Circuit from 1 September 2016. So now seems an appropriate time to record thanks to our CLT.

It has been an exacting 12 months: the two curtailments amongst the staff occasioned a great deal of work and catapulted us into stationing. Whilst we are mindful of the time given to this process by the Circuit Invitations Committee members, the amount of meetings, paperwork and preparation required of the CLT long before the CIC or church members get involved has to be experienced to be believed. All this work is in addition to the normal day to day tasks involved in keeping a circuit (albeit a small one) running smoothly in accordance with Methodist Church guidelines. This last year there has been all the additional work involved in preparing for the Consultation sessions, attending and documenting said sessions and, following the favourable vote, working to ensure that all the pre requisite work is undertaken and completed to ready for the new circuit. The CLT has been extremely thankful that David Lander came on board to take over all matters pertaining to the Manses and George Hammond has picked up the baton with regards to Circuit property matters. It doesn't bear thinking of the muddle we might be in today if the team (remember it has only been comprised of three people) had had to deal with property on top of everything else.

On top of the day to day tasks there are the training sessions which the team are requested to attend to ensure that they are up to speed with Methodist Church policies and procedures plus being up to date with Safeguarding.

We take this opportunity to thank Liz Swift, who is standing down at the end of this connexional year after 6 years service (two as senior circuit steward), and to Carole Steele and Linda Weedon who will both have given four years apiece to the circuit. These two ladies have offered their services to the new circuit should that be the desire of the Circuit meeting.

Whilst we extend our grateful thanks to the current team, we are also mindful of all those who have given freely of their time and energy during the life of the Woking & Walton-on-Thames circuit. The circuit could not have managed without you all and we send you all our heartfelt thanks.

May we all go forward in hope, joy and with excitement as we nurture the building and growth of a new circuit in this part of Surrey and the opportunities this gives to us all for spreading the message of Christ by word and by example together for God's glory.

Following wide consultation, the Methodist Conference in 2014 agreed that more time was needed for careful reflection before deciding whether to look again at our understanding of marriage. Same-sex marriage is not the only consideration. There are wider issues in relation to human relationships in the modern world which may or may not lead the church to reconsider our definition of marriage. The Conference in 2014 urged the Methodist people to engage with each other honestly, prayerfully and graciously in a process of deep reflection and discernment about matters relating to marriage and human relationships. Throughout the District there have been opportunities for conversations and during April this Circuit offered such an evening. At Synod conversations continued and feedback from all these conversations will be sent to the Connexional Team to enable them to discern the way forward for the Methodist Church. Up until recently, the definition of marriage within our church has been the same as the legal definition of marriage. With the passing of legislation to allow and recognise same sex marriage, this definition is no longer the same. In the light of this, the Connexion asked all churches to consider whether our definition of marriage needs to be re-visited, and - if so - to what conclusion.

Throughout the South East District, forums were held at which this question was discussed - in our Circuit we were invited to join with those from the Woking and Walton-on-Thames Circuit at an evening hosted at Woking Trinity in April. Feedback from this, and other meetings in the District, was fed back to the District Synod meeting. The Synod representatives spent some time considering the question, and its implications, and will forward the feedback from these - together with the feedback from the various circuit meetings - to Connexion for consideration in progressing the issue.

Some points coming out of the presentation include:

- \* The current Methodist Church's definition of marriage was formulated in 1992, when attitudes within our society were different. Today, same sex relationships are far more common, and affect the lives of many more families. This personal experience has an impact on attitudes.

- \* The Methodist Church must continue to explore how to respond to the needs of the changing world, but the Church must respond within its beliefs rather than conform to popular/secular beliefs and customs.

- \* There will be challenges to the church's missional and pastoral work whether the definition of marriage changes, or not; and by whether the Church is willing to engage in a conversation around this issue, or not.

We ask for your prayers for all those who are involved in progressing this issue, and for all those who have participated in the forums, and for those struggling with the issues this raises for them.

Churches and other religious groups were given the legal option to opt-in to conduct weddings for same-sex partners. ## The Wey Forward

By now you will have read the most recent bulletin from the Circuit Leadership Team published just after Easter, which updated all the churches in both the Woking & Walton-on-Thames and Guildford Circuits about the progress towards formation of the Wey Valley Circuit in September 2016. Before that happens, there will be some events to close down the business of our existing circuits, and give thanks for the faithful service of those who have led us over the many years of our existence. Your current Circuit Leaders are working hard to ensure that by the time Claire returns from sabbatical in July, and Conference has met and hopefully ratified the votes of the two Circuit Meetings and recent District Synod, we are on track to create the Wey Valley Circuit as a legal entity from September 1<sup>st</sup>. Part of this will include holding a (shadow) Wey Valley Circuit Meeting in July (chaired by our Superintendent Claire) to appoint all the new Circuit Officers (e.g. Circuit Stewards, Treasurer, Circuit Meeting Secretary, and representatives to the new Circuit meeting), and also agree the new Constitution and Mission statement, to underpin how we work together and also confirm our very reason for being.

All this work will 'come together' at our official Circuit Launch – a Circuit Service of recognition and commitment marking a new beginning at Trinity Methodist Church, Woking on September 11<sup>th</sup> at 6.30pm to which **YOU** are invited. But we are asking you to be actively involved in the planning and this needs thinking about before September!!

To mark the coming together of 13 churches as a new circuit, some of whom might even be unsure where the different parts are geographically located, each church will be asked to bring a symbol representing something special about their local community. (In a different setting when a similar model was used, a church in Twickenham brought a rugby ball to reflect their local community!). So now is the time to be creative and to start thinking about what your church can bring. At the service, all the gifts will be dedicated, and then distributed, so each church takes back a symbol representing something significant to another part of the circuit, as a focus of our unity across the new circuit.

Please book the date in your diary now and if you have a thought about what item could best represent your church, please let your church stewards know – they will be very pleased to hear lots of suggestions so get thinking!

The service will be led by Revds. John Hellyer (District Chair) and Conrad Hicks, (District Vice Chair with responsibility for our area) and other members of the new circuit will take part. All the new Circuit Officers and ministers who will by then have been appointed to serve the circuit will be formally recognised and commissioned as part of the service and the worship will be preceded by tea in good Methodist tradition.

## Refugees in Jordan—They still need your help

We were sitting in sweltering heat outside the prefabricated unit in Za'atari Camp, Jordan that was home to a family of 7 Syrian refugees. There is no running water, electricity is limited to a few hours each day, the communal sanitation blocks are too cold to use in winter. Still, at least there are no bombs here. Instead they live behind barbed wire fences with access controlled by the military, dependent on handouts for even their most basic needs. Um Abdhu 's husband was a baker with his own business in Derra, Syria when they were forced to flee their home after it was destroyed in the war. Now he cannot work as refugees in Jordan are not permitted legally to take employment.

Over 1.4m refugees have been welcomed into Jordan since the beginning of the Syrian conflict. Only 20% of these are housed in camps like Za'atari; they receive basic medical care, some education and a little food. But some families like Um Abdhu's, have been in Za'atari for nearly 3 years and they are slowly losing hope. The war still goes on, and their dreams of returning home are fading.

The majority of refugees live in the Jordanian community, often in poor housing conditions where they fall into debt and struggle to survive. After all this time, any savings they had are gone and so some work illegally, risking deportation if discovered and exploitation by employers. The World Food Programme has withdrawn its food vouchers from refugees living in the community as it has currently run out of funds.

In the midst of all this, All We Can's partners through Act Alliance are doing everything they can to help refugees rebuild their lives and enable them to stay with dignity and purpose in the Middle East where they have relatives and cultural roots. I have seen the difference that the programmes run by All We Can's partners are making to the lives of these refugees – through vocational training, medical help, cash donations to families in extreme need, providing psychological support to traumatised people and above all, a little hope.

There does not seem to be an end in sight to the critical situation in Syria which is causing so many people to become refugees. These are ordinary people uprooted from their lives in the most violent way and they need our help. There is so much more that could be done with more funding. Thank you to everyone who has already supported All We Can's Syria appeal. Every little gift really does help those in desperate need.
