## A message from our Superintendent

Love bade me welcome; yet my soul drew back, Guilty of dust and sin. But quick-eyed Love, observing me grow slack From my first entrance in, Drew nearer to me, sweetly questioning If I lack'd anything. 'A guest,' I answer'd, 'worthy to be here:' Love said. 'You shall be he.' 'I, the unkind, ungrateful? Ah, my dear, I cannot look on Thee.' Love took my hand and smiling did reply, 'Who made the eyes but I?' 'Truth, Lord; but I have marr'd them: let my shame Go where it doth deserve.' 'And know you not,' says Love, 'Who bore the blame?' 'My dear, then I will serve.' 'You must sit down,' says Love, 'and taste my meat.' So I did sit and eat.

George Herbert's poem so expertly captures that hesitancy so many people feel when they come face to face with grace. There is a sense of constant movement – the person moves a little closer, but then draws back because of their sense of sin, then learns more about God's love and comes closer again and finally accepts the wonder of God's forgiveness.

This poem is so true to human life. We get comfortable and settled. But then suddenly we are jolted – by the horror of a hurricane hitting Haiti – the country least able to withstand it – by the stories of civilians who are still trying to live amidst the destruction of Aleppo - by the tragedy of refugees waiting for the chance to start again. We can be jolted too by sudden pain and confusion and suffering in our own communities and lives, and we have to ask ourselves how humanity could stand any of this if there was no God who walked with us through it all – who knows what this feels like.


"Who made the eyes but I?" asked Love. We may not feel we are holy enough, good enough, 'spiritual' enough – yet we are invited to God's feast as an honoured guest. This is pure and unconditional grace. Every human being – those who are comfortable, those who are suffering, those who are confused, those who are confident, those who are fearful for the future – every one is invited to be God's guest.

In these three months we will travel through Advent, preparing ourselves for the coming of Christ. We will marvel again that God loved the world so much that he limited himself to live a human life on this very earth and defeated even death. In response we will have the opportunity to renew our Covenant promises –making a strong statement that we intend to cooperate with God in the way we live and the choices we make.

May God help us to notice his acts of grace and to celebrate them, moving closer all the time to accepting the love he has poured out for each of us.

## A new beginning

September marks a new beginning in the Methodist year. This September, though, is one of special new beginnings with the formation of the new Wey Valley Methodist Circuit, and the appointment of Rev Paul Chesworth as Minister for Trinity and St Michael's Church, Sheerwater. And so on Sunday 11<sup>th</sup> September, a beautiful late summer's evening, we met at Trinity for a very special celebration Circuit service.

This included the inauguration of the Wey Valley Circuit, the welcome of Paul and his wife Liz, along with the introduction and affirmation of all the presbyters and circuit stewards who will serve in the newly formed Circuit. And what a special service it was! Preceded by tea, the church was packed with friends from all the circuit churches from Cranleigh and Godalming in the south, to Walton-on-Thames in the north, and attended also by a number of civic and ecumenical guests.

The new Circuit came into being on September  $1^{st}$  – a joining of 13 churches in the Guildford and Woking & Walton-on-Thames Circuits – each with its own distinctive personality and gifts, looking forward to mutual sharing and support and responding together to the gospel of God's love in the community and the wider world. During the service the churches each gave and received a gift to symbolize this sharing of dreams, ideas and resources.

The service was presided over by Rev Dr Claire Potter – our Superintendent Minister - who welcomed us and lit a Circuit candle as a symbol of our unity in Christ – light of the world. Later in the service thirteen smaller candles were lit, one for each of the churches, and were received by their Senior Steward.

Rev John Hellyer, Chair of the South East District, preached at the service and Rev Conrad Hicks (Assistant Chair) refused to be defeated by delays on the M25 and arrived just in time to welcome the new Circuit staff! John Hellyer, in his message to the congregation asked what sort of relationships we wanted to build within our new Circuit? A stay in hospital had prompted him to think about how hospitals 'work'. Two main themes were apparent – teamwork and accountability. Linking this to the Gospel message (Mark 6), John talked of how Jesus' instructions to his disciples talked of mutual support, time for rest and recreation and time to grow and learn - lessons for us as we journey together. He also spoke of our need for accountability. First and foremost to be accountable to God in our individual and collective discipleship, but also accountable to the world in which we live – our mission, to the wider church in our ecumenism and finally to the people we come into contact with in our pastoral care. To work as a 'team' and be fully accountable is not possible in our own strength, but through the fruits of the Spirit, and by God's Grace we are able to build relationships of integrity, honesty, forgiveness and trust as we move forward to love and serve God together.

With wonderful musical accompaniment and singing, the service was one of dedication and celebration – a fitting beginning for an exciting time ahead, both as a new Circuit and at Trinity and St Michael's Sheerwater with Paul, looking forward to where God will lead us.

### **Church buildings: bane or blessing?**

Our Circuit's church buildings are all very different – varying from the 1000-year-old building in which the Methodists worship at St Mary's Guildford to Trinity Woking which was completed in 1965. Regardless of the age and style of our church buildings, the one thing they have in common is the opportunity they provide for our mission.

One of the most exciting challenges for us is how we respond to the opportunity to use our buildings to shape our relationship with our communities. If we believe that our mission is to stand alongside the vulnerable, the lost and the disenfranchised in order to reveal the transforming love of God, then how can our buildings support that mission?

It is not simply a matter of how we use the premises: although if we offer our premises to various groups but have no relationship with these groups and their members – in fact are often not present when they are on the premises – then we are more likely to be considered a Community Centre than a Church by them, and our relationship will be land-lord to tenant. Equally, if we sit in our committees and church councils and decide what the needs of the community are without any dialogue with community representatives, and set up groups and activities to service this need, then our relationship risks being patronising.

Clearly, how we use the building is important in terms of our mission: if we want to develop relationships with other groups that use them we need to explore how to do that with these groups; and if we want to be relevant to the community we need to be engaging with the community to identify local needs. But how can the building itself reflect the mission of the church, and offer others an encounter with the risen Christ?

Imagine that someone new comes into your church buildings: what would they see? And how would that enable them to understand what the purposes and values of your church are? How accessible is the Sanctuary, or is it hidden behind solid closed doors creating a sense of "us and them"? What literature and information is available for the passer-by to take away, and how suitable is its language and content for a non-churched individual? How does your building serve as a welcome to the stranger?

Three questions we were asked to consider at a recent Circuit Stewards' conference are:

- What theological principles should inform the way we shape our buildings?
- What theological principles should inform the way we use our buildings?
- How can we support Managing Trustees in making good decisions about the development and use of our buildings?

At a time when mission is at the top of the agenda in our churches, and when a number of our churches are also looking at their buildings as a resource that supports the church mission, how we answer these three questions at Circuit Leadership Team and local church levels will be critical to answering the key question: are our church buildings a bane or a blessing?

Why not come and visit us any week? Coffee is served on a Thursday morning at 10am, followed by a time of prayer, and every Saturday from 10am to 12 noon.



## Cranleigh

Representatives from Cranleigh were delighted to be present at the impressive Launch Service for our new Circuit on September 11<sup>th</sup>. It was great to chat to old and new friends, and to meet yet more people as we exchanged representative pictorial emblems from our different partner churches. We now know a lot more about Addlestone church and area, as we received the delightful knitted bus, which reminded us of the firm which employed many workers in the area, including past members of Addlestone Church.

We have also been pleased to welcome new preachers from the northern end of Wey Valley circuit, and I know our ministers and preachers have in some cases already made new friends in return. These fresh contacts invigorate us all!

In my last article I mentioned Cranleigh's Alterations Project (Phase Two) which has had to be re-considered in view of the prohibitive costs involved in the original plan. The Church Council has agreed that the Revd Dr Claire Potter, with a small number from the Project Group, should meet with a new architect to discuss the feasibility and cost-effectiveness of our plans to reach out to the community in a more positive way. These plans include a re-designed porch, light and airy, and providing a screened, multi-purpose area separate from the sanctuary, but which could be joined to it if a larger space were required. Other areas requiring attention include the kitchen and toilets, other small back rooms, an outside play area and, of course, parking spaces.

At this time of the year we organise what we are pleased to call our 'Outreach Tea' and invitations have already been sent to lonely or needy people in our community to come and share tea with us from 2.45pm on the afternoon of Saturday, December 10<sup>th</sup>. Last year, for the first time, we incorporated this event with our Christmas concert of seasonal music, which we had previously performed on a Saturday evening in aid of Action for Children. We found the changed time successful, and many of our guests contributed to this worthwhile cause.

Members of other charitable groups also helped with food, waiting at table, washing up and offering lifts to visitors. If you are reading this article, please consider joining us for tea and carols, but do let us know, so we have enough food and room! (contact Jane O'Leary or myself – details in the Circuit Directory)

We have good connections with other churches in our village, and at important festival times, including Christmas and Easter, advertise each others' events (and united ones) by means of a stall distributing leaflets. As well as our own Carol Service and Gift Service (proceeds to AFC) we join St Nicolas Parish Church in a Carol Service on the Sunday evening before Christmas and in Midnight Communion on Christmas Eve.

We look forward to receiving news from old friends and new in this latest publication of 'The Wey Forward'. A happy Christmas to you all!

## **Godalming United Church**

During the church's quiet month of August our upstairs Vestry, Lammas Room, and Committee Room (with their incomparable views over the Wey and water meadows) were modernised. The elderly east- and south-facing windows have been replaced with improved well-insulated walls and windows which will solve the problem of winter chill and summer over-heating. The work was completed on schedule, and the refurbished rooms are in use. The Vestry has been transformed from a drab office (used by many and "owned" by none) into a peaceful retreat where Paul can welcome visitors, and ministers can prepare themselves in an atmosphere of calm.

The next phase of refurbishment - the replacement of the Hall roof slates (113 years old!) – took place across October half-term. Summer 2017 will see the complete refurbishment of the downstairs River Room (opening out onto the Lammas Lands) and kitchen.

Our Harvest Festival on October 9<sup>th</sup> was declared by all to be "the best ever"! Gifts of non-perishable foods were offered in thanksgiving, and the church was decked out for family café-style worship. A christening at the start of the service made it a doubly special event. The service was attended by around 200 people and around 100 stayed for lunch – a "bring-and-share" event that flowed seamlessly from the service.

Our charitable link with the Gambia remains as active as ever, and a container of goods – mainly recycled school furniture – departed for Banjul in November. This autumn we had a relief appeal for the Haitian hurricane disaster (Christian Aid) and for the Italian Earthquake – funds being directed through our mission partners Daniel and Grace Pratt-Morris-Chapman who are working for the Italian Methodist Mission.

- January 15<sup>th</sup> Godalming and District Churches Together United Service at GUC 10.30 am – our annual affirmation of ecumenism and a chance to worship together with friends from other churches



#### Amazing Grace – "Live Like You're Loved"

On Sunday 2<sup>nd</sup> October the young people of Trinity Methodist Church in Woking organised a Youth led service called Amazing Grace. From 6 o'clock in the evening the church began to fill with over 60 people, three quarters of which were young people from churches and youth groups all over Surrey. In order to create an appropriate space, the young people spent hours beforehand transforming and redecorating the church into a safe place for the congregation to worship or pray freely in whatever way they wanted.

The service was based on God's Grace and Love for us, and the senses were used to explore different prayer methods and to help focus prayer to strengthen – and for some people, to start – their relationship with God. Dinner was provided; hot dogs and cakes; and everyone was encouraged into small groups with strangers of all ages to discuss their faith and just get to know each other. Everyone left with at least one more friend than they came in with! The evening then continued with modern worship songs, led by a small band of Anna Kozlowska (vocals/guitar), Evie Oldfield (keyboard) and Ben Hillman (percussion). During this time there was a mixture of people worshipping along with the band, groups in deep conversation that came from the random group pairing, and those exploring prayer stations – set up by the young people. These involved going deeper into prayer with the use of smelling different fragrances and herbs; touching different materials (things that helped an individual focus); tasting oils that originated from the time of Jesus; reflecting on a variety of pictures and reflections in mirrors.

The service also involved an inspirational talk on grace, given by Sam Taylor who led us in prayer, which was followed by a time of complete silence in the church, the only thing to be heard was the hum of the sound system and cars driving past in the distance. This reflective time was followed by more worship, led by the band. After this, the whole congregation linked together for a group prayer the whole church took part in. The prayers for this came from a prayer tree set up that the congregation added to. The evening then concluded with the congregation getting back into their groups of strangers, blessing each other in prayer, discussing their evening with each other, and joining in on more worship and praise through song.

## **Trinity Harvest Supper**

Our Harvest weekend was on 1<sup>st</sup> and 2<sup>nd</sup> October and the theme for the weekend was the Refugee crisis in the world, and supporting the 'All We Can' Syria appeal.

Rev Claire Hargreaves, who led our worship on Sunday morning has a particular interest in this charity (formerly known as the Methodist Relief and Development Fund) and its work with Syrian refugees in Jordan. Lebanon is a neighbour of Jordan and has taken in many Syrian refugees and so because Woking has a very good Lebanese restaurant we thought we could tie these things together and have a Lebanese meal on the Saturday night and raise funds for the Charity at the same time. So tickets were sold and 76 Trinity folk and friends came to enjoy the supper and support the Charity.

The restaurant was happy to cater for us and sent along two chefs, Abdul and George, who brought the food and served it – which went down very well with the ladies of Trinity who are usually in the kitchen! They provided a delicious chicken and rice dish, also aubergine moussaka, pitta breads and a green salad and then baklava pastries. We also served Turkish Delight with coffee or tea.

We were very fortunate to have two really good speakers for the evening. Firstly Lisa Barrott, one of our own members, told us about an event called Refugee Tales - a walk of solidarity with refugees, asylum seekers and detainees that she had taken part in along with Rev Bryony Davis. It was organized by the Gatwick Detainees Support Group – the Harvest Charity which Trinity supported in 2015. The 58 mile walk from Canterbury to Westminster following the Chaucer tales idea took place between  $4^{th} - 8^{th}$  July and offered the walkers an opportunity to reflect on the long and dangerous journeys that many refugees make fleeing war and persecution. Support was given along the way by many local communities and by churches offering food and accommodation. Lisa told us what an impact it had made on her to talk with some of the refugees on the walk. Another walk is mooted for next July and Lisa would be happy to speak to anyone interested in taking part.

The second speaker was Adam Thomas from Woking Borough Council. Adam is the Family Support Team Manager who with his team are responsible for supporting Syrian refugee families in Woking. In September 2015 David Cameron, then Prime Minister, had made a pledge that the UK would take in 20,000 families from Syria. Woking Council have responded to this and currently 12 families have been housed and are living in the Borough with more to come.

Adam stressed that the role of his team is to support and guide the families as they settle into their new surroundings. With the aid of volunteers, families are helped to adapt to their new lives. Help is given in various ways from taking someone to the dentist or doctor or going shopping to more involved things like form filling. The team is only small so volunteers and helpers are invaluable to them. If anyone is interested in offering support please call 01483 743812 or email refugee.support@woking.gov.uk

Everyone who came thoroughly appreciated the evening. We enjoyed good company over the delicious food but were also given a challenge with the thought provoking talks. Trinity proved to be generous with giving as well – we raised £1119.50p over the weekend which has been gratefully received by All We Can.
