A message from our Superintendent

Dear Friends,

Welcome to the start of our second Connexional year as the Wey Valley Circuit.

I feel we are very fortunate to have this river with such a great name running through the length of our Circuit!

In the last year I feel that I have seen and heard every possible pun on the name of the river 'Wey'. Now I have said that, I am sure plenty more will be thought up!

When we walked the Wey on the Circuit walk in June we saw narrow boats called 'Wey to go' and 'This is the Wey'. As the day progressed, we kept assuring ourselves that this walk was 'downhill all the Wey'. In Cranleigh there is a hairdresser called the 'Wey Ahead'.

All these phrases are about travelling and moving on. The way is a path, a direction, a route.

Our circuit magazine's name 'Wey Forward' is visionary, (and I can say that because I was not the one who thought it up!). It gives a positive intentional



impression. We are following a route <u>into the future</u>. And as we do that, we take with us all of our traditions and experiences from the past, we digest them and learn from them – the difficult parts as well as the good ones – and we travel on. There is always a sense of movement, of new things emerging, of older things changing and developing.

There are places where the Wey is very sleepy and almost still and others where it rushes over weirs with great ferocity. That variety is not a bad image for our Circuit either. We do need at times to stop and take stock, to make space to listen to God and to ensure that all voices are heard. At times we also need to move on so that our churches are seeking all the time to live out a relevant witness to God's love and forgiveness in their own communities. The world is changing rapidly. Churches need to change too, but not without taking care of all people and their thoughts and not without waiting on God. As a community of varied people, it is unsurprising that some want to move more quickly than others, on all sorts of issues.

So what is the Wey Forward? Is there one way forward or many? And who decides? One of Fred Pratt Green's hymns includes the words

"Though what's ahead is mystery, and life itself is ours on lease. each day the Spirit says to me: Go forth in peace" (STF 709)

We cannot have answers to many of our questions but we can walk forward together in faith and hope, trusting that God's Spirit will guide and inspire us. Jesus told his disciples that <u>he</u> is the way and the truth and the life. He showed them that meant loving neighbours and enemies, picking up people who were downtrodden, welcoming everyone, and valuing the human being behind their condition, or their background, or their culture, or their lifestyle. Jesus, the way, is the model for <u>our</u> way.

Downhill all the Wey

45,000 paces 20.2 miles 14 canal locks 13 churches 1 Birthday



Members of nine of the Wey Valley Circuit's thirteen churches joined the Circuit's first birthday celebration walk on a bright, sunny Saturday early in June. The Wey Navigation was constructed as far as Guildford about 350 years ago and even the four miles from Guildford on to Godalming have been used for 250 years. The tow path follows the water's edge for over 20 miles from Godalming to the point where the Wey flows into the Thames. The tow path begins at the car park of Godalming United Church and the Town Lock in Weybridge is a minute or two from Weybridge Methodist Church. The water flows within easy reach of most of the Circuit churches, with the disused Wey/Arun canal branching to Cranleigh and the Basingstoke Canal passing Sheerwater, Woking and Knaphill. Only West Horsley is left high and dry away from the river, with Walton placed firmly by the Thames.

Thirteen people left Godalming at 8.15am in the morning, with various church members joining and leaving the route during the day as they passed St Mary's, Stoughton, Merrow, Byfleet and Addlestone. About 30 gallons of tea, (thank you to Linda and her team), were demolished at Weybridge, when we arrived at 5.15pm, well ahead of schedule. Five of the group, including Superintendent Claire, walked the full distance.

Perfect weather, a tranquil setting, wonderful views, deer, kestrels, swans and cygnets, John Donne's house, canoes, a narrow boat called 'Epworth', iridescent blue butterflies, good company, another narrow boat called 'Wey ahead'. Thank you for coming: perhaps, next year, we will do it by boat.

Appreciating Church taster sessions

Appreciating our own church can be a challenge for us in our local churches, as we are tempted to be discouraged by falling numbers, ageing members and a list of chores that seems never-ending. But the recent Taster Sessions facilitated by a team from the Discipleship and Ministries Learning Network (DMLN) proved that it is a challenge worth accepting.

The opening exercise for the 21 people from churches across the Circuit was to change the narrative of this pessimistic outlook: to see the good things that are happening in our churches and the opportunities that these good things herald.

For me, the most challenging exercise was to think about the sort of things I tell myself about my church. And as if it wasn't sobering enough to think about how I do think of my church, I was then challenged to think about how this might differ from the things I would tell others. Someone in the group shared that this was challenging because she isn't really comfortable to tell others about her church. It was more comfortable to think about what others in my church say about our church, but less so to consider what those outside the church altogether might say about our church. I found myself with much food for thought. And this was only one exercise!

The taster sessions were well-received by those who attended, although everything was not taken at face value, which resulted in good discussion.

Appreciating Church is based on Appreciative Inquiry – a process by which we approach a situation with a positive attitude to recognise and build on the good we have. This is not a process designed to make us take an unrealistically optimistic view of the future: rather it is designed to build on our foundational good practices and to encourage thinking about developing these. It is hoped that the Circuit offer of a team to work with churches in discerning their calling and affirming their ministry – using Appreciating Church – will be adopted.

Further ahead, we have arranged the date of our Harvest Weekend: October 7th and 8th. Details are not yet finalised, but on Sunday evening (the 8th) we hope to join in a joint celebration, arranged by CTC, in the Baptist Church.

More plans are in the pipeline, as always, for even later events. After the large Remembrance Sunday Service on November 12th in Fountain Square, people tend to think about switching on Christmas lights and even singing carols! We have already planned a date for our Saturday afternoon Community Tea and Concert (December 16th), and the augmented choir will hope to repeat a similar programme in the splendid new hall at Elmbridge Village on Tuesday the 19th. It is hoped to have a party for the children on Sunday afternoon, December 10th. I have not even mentioned the various carol services, which have been rather harder to plan as Christmas Eve is a Sunday! The Village Carol Service will be on the previous Sunday, the 17th.

Finally, our Building Project is progressing well, and planning permission has been granted, but with certain conditions! Timing is still difficult to predict so we are waiting for decisions to be made so that the work may be started.

Guildford St Mary's

This issue of the Circuit magazine coincides with the 4th Anniversary of Guildford Methodist Church's move to St. Mary's in the heart of Guildford town centre. From very different backgrounds, in the historic setting of St Mary's in Quarry Street we are building a Fresh Expression of church. At a recent meeting for the congregation it was notable that those present rejected references to "two congregations" but emphasised that St. Mary's worshippers now view themselves as one community.

September will see the first anniversary of our Common Ground initiative and we will celebrate that with a special service on Sunday 17 September, probably late afternoon, to which all will be welcome. This year has been a mixture of feasibility study, trying to define our place and role, broadening the range of churches involved and actually doing things. For some activities, the "doing" is Common Ground itself organising the activity – for others we are helping to facilitate initiatives bubbling up from around the town's churches. One unexpected benefit is a sense of empowerment for some people in feeling they are better able to work closer with other churches on Common Ground initiatives than if they are seen to be just promoting a single church's initiative.

ChitChat, our weekly drop-in for international residents, continues to be very popular with referrals from a range of agencies, individuals such as language teachers and word of mouth. It welcomes around 30 guests and 15 volunteers each week. Indeed, it has even been requested that we launch an evening ChitChat but that will depend on expanding the pool of volunteers. We are delighted that a termly informal celebration of Holy Communion has seen a few guests attend in addition to volunteer hosts.

Opening St. Mary's offers us many pastoral opportunities – we ran a "PRAYING STATION" on Polling Day and nearly 70 people dropped in on a day when prayerful reflection was much needed. As the Rector put it, that feels like "more pastoral opportunities than I get in a year!"

We have just agreed to host an Arts Festival on Saturday 11 November showcasing the work of a number of Christian artists, most of whom should be attending to talk about their works.

We have lots of activities coming up — I do hope you will be able to join us for some of them.

Sadly our preacher for the big Anniversary day on June 11th – Rev'd John Walker, who presided over the union of our two churches 40 years ago – was taken ill the night before. However, GUC rallied to the emergency – Senior Steward Alan Steele delivered a sermon on the Trinity, (for it was Trinity Sunday), Barbara Saunders gave an amusing family talk on assembling the flower festival, Gwen Wheatman led the prayers - and happily John Walker has made a good recovery.

The church looked stunning for the Anniversary Flower Festival - "Together with Flowers" – which brought in many visitors from the town and beyond to view over 30 exhibits. A barbecue and entertainments followed the Sunday morning service, and a memorable weekend concluded with the Circuit Service in the evening.

The following weekend we welcomed younger visitors and their carers for our second "Messy Church" – based on the calling of the four fishermen and involving plenty of waterside fun with paddling pools doubling up as the Sea of Galilee.

Later in June in a special post-election Sunday service, Kate Sherlock – Baroness Parminter of Godalming, and member of our congregation - was "in conversation" with Paul Hulme. Kate is Lib-Dem deputy-leader in the House of Lords, and her background is in charities and social responsibility. Particular interests are the environment, animal welfare, literacy and the role of women. She also has a degree in Theology – so was well able discuss the impact of her beliefs on her politics!

We are well on the way to completing our Anniversary appeal to fund 40 cataract operations in the Gambia. The Gambian cataract specialist was trained up with the support of church members and runs cataract clinics in various localities throughout the country. Each procedure costs a mere $\pm 15 -$ what incredible value for the gift of sight!

Many thanks to all who contributed to the Whitechapel Appeal in July. Your much-needed items are essential to the continued existence of this Mission for the Homeless which is open from 6pm-11am 365 days a year, providing all who come – up to 300 a day – with the opportunity to shower, have a change of clothes and eat a nourishing breakfast.

Across the summer our downstairs facilities are undergoing a major extension/refurbishment. The River Room is being enlarged by 25%, with easy access to an improved patio, and the kitchen is being totally replaced. Sunday services will continue as normal during the works, but car parking will be restricted. This is a big and complex project which we hope will be completed by the second week in September.



Walton on Thames

Walton Bible Study Group—The Exodus


Ancient Egypt in the time of Moses continues to be a popular topic for films and television documentaries. However, some of the ideas put forward ignore recent research and so are likely to generate many lively debates. I would like to share some of the insights gained during our studies of




the Exodus, which we found very interesting and challenging.

We based our discussions around four publications: "Moses Face to Face with God" (2005) by the Methodist, Elizabeth Rundle, in the Cover to Cover Bible Study series; "On the Reliability of the Old Testament" (2003) by the Methodist Professor, Ken Kitchen, a leading authority on Egyptology; "From Eden to Exile" by David Rohl (2002), an expert on archaeology with some unusual ideas; and "The Miracles of Exodus" (2003) by Colin Humphreys, who uses his scientific expertise with great skill.

Rohl suggests that the death of the firstborn, the last of the ten plagues, was a cultural norm imposed by priests in the Middle East at that time, to avert even greater disasters, rather than a demand of the Hebrew God. Surprisingly, there is a wide agreement that the number of people leaving Egypt was between 20,000 and 30,000, not over one million, as is found in Bible translations and films. This is because the Hebrew word translated as *"thousand"* is identical to that for *"family, group or clan"*.






We noted that the Hebrews escaped from Egypt during the one month of the year when the desert blossomed, so their flocks could be fed as they headed for Mt Sinai, an erupting volcano in Midian, located in present day Saudi Arabia. They followed smoke by day and fire by night; part of the earliest detailed description of an erupting volcano. This area is full of distinctive Midianite pottery from the time of Moses, whereas none have been found in the Sinai Peninsula. A confirmation of this route is that there is only one place where crossing *"The Red Sea"* (Greek Septuagint), or *"The Sea of Reeds"* (Hebrew), is accurate in both translations - at the northern end of the Gulf of Agaba where freshwater springs enable an

expanse of reeds to grow.

This shows us that God can encourage us to do things at the right time and that He can show His power through natural events. We expect to be changed as we study God's word and have fellowship together. After completing a study of the first half of John's gospel, we plan to return to the Old Testament in September with a look at King Solomon and the Jewish temple.

The Ride & Stride

September 9th, 2017

Background

Most counties in England have an annual 'Ride & Stride', on the second Saturday in September, to raise money for church restoration and repair. The idea is that cyclists, (and walkers), are given a list of churches in their area. They map out their own route to visit churches by bike or on foot, and then get friends to sponsor them for a fixed amount per church visited.

The money that is collected is divided into two. Half the monies go to the church of the cyclist's choice (i.e. your church); the other half is retained by the Surrey Churches Preservation Trust for distribution to churches in need (that apply for a grant).

In the dozen years that the Bike Ride, (now Ride and Stride) has been running in Surrey we have raised over £250,000.



The umbrella organisation is the **Surrey Churches Preservation Trust**, with trustees from most Christian denominations.

The Trustees give out grants twice a year to deserving applications.

The Clothes and Bedding Bank continues to grow. It is held in the church hall on the 3rd Saturday of the month although there has been an increase in demand for ad-hoc appointments. The team are looking forward to helping other churches as they commence similar initiatives. In addition we are on the list to supply victims of the Grenfell Tower inferno should a shortfall of requirements be identified once the mass of donations has been sorted and assessed.

The Weybridge Old Folks Club is facing a major change as the Weybridge Hall closes in August 2017. The old folk have met there for 43 years and the change of venue will be of enormous significance. Our church volunteers are helping to manage this change which is challenging to the folk, particularly to the 10 nonagenarians who have been attending for nearly 30 years.

Weybridge continues to host a monthly coffee morning on the 2nd Saturday of the month on the Addlestone Methodist church premises. This allows Weybridge to take advantage of Addlestone's prime position on the high street but also assists AMC's aim of having the church open every Saturday without calling on the AMC member's every week.

The au pair support group has started. As with all new initiatives it has started small but the need is there and we pray that news will spread and allow this group to become a real support to the lonely young women so far from home and family.

CONQUERING SNOWDON

At the instigation of David Jones a group from Trinity have for some months been enjoying weekly walks around the Woking area and the Surrey Hills. KOREAN PRAYER MISSION TO WALTON

Readers may like to know about the major six-day Christian prayer mission to Walton which started on 27th June at the invitation of "Walton Churches Together". There was sustained prayer for all eight Churches in the town, their respective leaders and for the town itself. The teaching on prayer was very useful, reminding us of the need for intercessions to be specific, with an adequate amount of time given in prayer whilst seeking the guidance and power of the Holy Spirit. We are very grateful to



the energetic Korean team who spent so much time praying for us and the community.

Brexit : the impact and consequences

Conference at Methodist Central Hall Westminster 24th June

This day conference aimed to inform, inspire and empower all to speak with Christian attitudes and spiritual insight into the situation surrounding negotiations of the UK on leaving EU membership (Brexit).

Reverend Rose Hudson-Wilkin, Chaplain to the Queen and the Houses of Parliament, reminded us of the words of the late Jo Cox MP – we have far more in common than the things that divide us – asking that differing views over Brexit should be aired and listened to with respect for each other's points of view.

Lord Griffiths, Superintendent Minister of Wesley's Chapel and a member of the House of Lords on the Labour benches, spoke of the complexities of the Brexit decision, highlighting the need to decide what kind of country we wanted to live in, an outward looking, inclusive nation or an inward facing society.

Denis McShane, former Labour MP and UK minister for Europe, lamented the lack of power and influence the UK would have in Europe once we had given up "our seat at the table".

Tom Brake, Liberal Democrat MP, said his party opposed Brexit and had three priorities; to keep the UK in the single market and customs union to help trade and business continue, to keep co-operation with in the security services, and to safeguard EU citizens' rights, all of which were up for negotiation. He regretted that Brexit was taking focus away from national issues such as education, NHS and the elderly.

Other speakers spoke about the legal implications of Brexit, the impact on aid budgets, (sterling has fallen, reducing the effectiveness of financial aid), the fear of a refugee crisis in Europe which influenced the Brexit vote, the resultant spike in hate crime, hate speech and the rise of far right ideas, the likely difficulty for cross-European educational opportunities for young people, and the legal status of immigrants.


I was invited to speak about the plight of refugees fleeing Syria and coming to Europe, how the churches can help to meet their needs and also try to raise awareness that refugees are not threatening to overwhelm our way of life but are families and people with the same concerns, aims and aspirations as we have.

We were asked to think about how, as individual Christians and as churches, we could help others to work through the issues thrown up by Brexit in a reasonable, peaceful and harmonious way, emphasising the love and compassion shown by Jesus to those in need. Lord Griffiths pointed out that Brexit has thrown down a philosophical challenge to the UK to work out its place and attitude in the world. In determining this, the church needs to find its voice and make sure it is in the debate.
