Why Are People Living in Poverty in Britain Today?

The Woking Debates held this debate on 17th March at Christ Church where 35

people heard three excellent speakers.



The Chair, Des Coles opened the debate giving the UN definitions of poverty and some statistics. In 2015 4.5 million people were in poverty in the UK and more than 1 in 4 children. There are more than thirty times as many food banks as in 1989.

Lorraine Buchanan, the chief executive of Woking Citizens Advice spoke first. She said Maybury and Sheerwater wards in

Woking are two of the most deprived wards in Surrey. A significant life change such as losing your job, developing mental illness or losing your partner can plunge people into poverty. It can happen to us all.

Will Forster, leader of the Liberal Democrats on Woking Council spoke next. He was brought up by a mother on benefits but there are not many people with similar backgrounds who are key decision makers. Politics needs to be more representative. Will said, we need better paid more skilled jobs so there is no need for Tax Credits. One in five children have food insecurity in our country, nearly the highest in the developed world. The U.K. Is particularly unequal as a society and Surrey's richness hides the poverty here. Pensions have risen since 2010 but child benefit has not. Last week there was a change in the provision of free school meals



raising the threshold in the whole of the U.K. except in Northern Ireland. If you are a care leaver you have less than a 10% chance of going to university. From established homes you have a 60% chance. We need to start asking uncomfortable questions.

Sarah Goddard is from Christians Against Poverty and employed by Christ Church as a debt adviser. Her team will go and visit people in their homes and help them apply for benefits. Their central office in Bradford will negotiate with their creditors. People deeply in debt often have other issues. With other churches they run a job club and Fresh Start an eight week course for people with addictions. She quoted the case of one person they help who is in her 50s and

living on the single allowance of £73.10. After bills this leaves her £29 a week food, toiletries and presents. She needs to go into the library to do her benefit applications online but could not afford the bus fare so they help her with that. She has learning problems and received two letters about meetings. She thought she only needed to go to the second of the meetings and went there but was sanctioned for four weeks for not attending the first. This sent her finances into meltdown. Being part of a caring supportive community makes a huge difference for people on benefits.

The meeting was opened up to those present; The point was made that most of the benefit bill goes on the old age pension. Yet this is not enough to support live in carers.

Lorraine spoke about how CAB is open to all. People are embarrassed to be in poverty and some come in with bags of unopened letters. Often their family is the last to know their situation. The CAB used to have an emergency fund supported by funding from the Mayors charity but recent mayors have chosen different charities and funds have dwindled. Byfleet has its own charity and the CAB sees few people from there and the Lions have a fund to help with heating.

Societies that are more equal are happier. Poverty needs to become a priority. If we tell our politicians this is a major priority then they will listen. It is up to us.

In a recent <u>article</u>, published on safeguarding and in light of the recent Oxfam and Haiti scandal, Karl Wilding stated that "Abuses of power...may not happen in our name, even if they happen on our watch."

How, then, do faith institutions protect children from abuse of power?
What measures should be taken when cases of abuse do take place?
And, how do you draw a balance between custom faith traditions and safeguarding laws to protect against behavioural misconduct before it occurs?



The recent revelations concerning behavioural misconduct in the charity sector has shone a light on the importance of ensuring that all organisations that work, or come into contact, with children are regularly updating safeguarding procedures.

Hate crime and extremism

Across the last month there have been a number of disturbing incidents and the level of reported hate incidents, more generally, continues to be high.

Bishop Richard Atkinson and Jatinder Singh Birdi, Co-Chairs, Inter Faith Network for the UK The Punish a Muslim letters have been strongly condemned and police forces have been taking action to reassure communities in their areas. In some areas counter action is taking place, such as a solidarity gathering being organised by the North Kirklees Inter-Faith Council on Saturday 30 March outside Dewsbury Town Hall www.examiner.co.uk/news/people-faiths-stage-show-solidarity-14461731

Hindu and Sikh communities and some Christian groups have expressed concern about attacks on members of their communities and their premises – in some cases due to mistaken identity. Conversation is ongoing between them and the Government about availability of relevant data.

The NSPCC noted on 20 March that: 'Recent figures from UK police forces show 5,349 hate crimes were recorded against under-18s with a racial, religious or faith-based element, a 14% increase in 1 year' and has launched a new programme in response.

There has also been growing concern about the rise of extreme voices on the far right. Recently release figures to March 2017 show that while the majority of referrals to Prevent, continue to relate to Islamist extremism, the number of people referred to a UK government counter-extremism programme because of concerns about right wing extremism has risen by more than a quarter, official figures show. 968 such individuals were referred to Prevent, an increase of 28% from the previous year. The proportion of referrals for right wing extremism rose in the year to 16% of all referrals, up from 10% in the previous period. www.theguardian.com/uk-news/2018/mar/27/far-right-referrals-prevent-programme-up-by-more-than-a-quarter-counter-extremism.

Young people and inter faith engagement

Interfaith Network (IFN) is continuing its programme of work on youth inter faith engagement, entitled 'Connect: the inter faith engagement of young people'. This will lead to publication of a new edition of IFN's youth inter faith action guide Connect: Different Faiths, Shared Values https://www.interfaith.org.uk/connect and also feed into a special youth-focused National Meeting of IFN in July. The programme is being carried out with the help of an Advisory Group, co-facilitated by IFN Trustee Padideh Sabeti and youth co-facilitator, Jaskiran Kaur Mehmi.

IFN has been consulting in a number of ways. Key to the programme is hearing the views of young people. IFN has therefore held focus group sessions in Birmingham, Cardiff, Glasgow, Leeds and London for young people aged 16-25 across February and March. Inter Faith Week 2018

Inter Faith Week 2018 will take place from 11 – 18 November. It will be the 10th Inter Faith Week.

Inter Faith Week begins on Remembrance Sunday each year and runs until the following Sunday. The Week begins on Remembrance Sunday and many people of different faiths and beliefs will be marking that in some way. The additional Sunday provides the opportunity for other weekend events to take place.



Civic remembrance activities are often held on a multi faith basis, recognising the contributions made by people of all faiths and beliefs during armed conflicts – whether through military service or work for peace. This year, Remembrance Sunday will also be Armistice Day, and the centenary of the end of World War One.

Inter Faith Week is a week about respect, understanding, relationship building and genuine discussion about issues - about 'living well together'. It is a tremendous opportunity to reach out, learn, make new connections and develop friendships and working partnerships which help make for greater neighbourliness and more integrated and cohesive communities. It is also a great platform for all who want to increase religious literacy and understanding of diversity.

Last year for the first time, IFN made available Inter Faith Week branded pin badges to buy via the Inter Faith Week website. These proved to be very popular, and it is planned to do this again in 2018. If there are other items which you think would be particularly helpful in spreading the word and raising awareness about the Week, please let the IFN office know and we will explore these.

Religious festivals and calendars

The pattern of religious festivals in different faith communities changes throughout the year. A number have recently taken place such as Naw Ruz (Baha'i) and NoRuz (Zoroastrian), and Rama Navami (Hindu). Others are taking place now or shortly, including Mahavira Jayanti (Jain); Good Friday and Easter (Christian) and Pesach/Passover (Jewish).

- takes place in the UK or Isle of Man;
- doesn't have religious or political aims (although you can still apply if you're a religious organisation);
- meets the Co-op's values;
- takes place or will still be running after October 2019;
- benefits your local community.

Preference will be given to projects run by small, local organisations that make a real difference to people in their community. You can't apply if your organisation is run for private profit.

Garfield Weston Foundation Celebrates 60th Anniversary with One-Off Charitable Fund

The Garfield Weston Foundation has reached its sixtieth year of grant giving in the UK and has chosen to celebrate with a new one-off fund that offers grants of between £30,000 and £150,000 to registered charities, ClOs, places of worship and state schools.

The Fund is exclusively aimed at supporting capital costs. Groups in need of revenue funding should apply to the Foundation's main grants programme. Funding is available for:

- New community facilities.
- Improvement of community facilities.
- Items that require a sizeable investment e.g. purchase of minibus.
- Improvements to outdoor spaces and facilities for sport and exercise or community use.
- New buildings or extensions to an existing building for community use e.g. new kitchen, meeting room or storage facility.
- Improvements to, or renovation or refurbishment of, an existing building such as installing a toilet and servery in a rural church for community use.
- New fixed playground equipment, climbing walls or multiuse games area in a public playing field.
- Purchase of large or expensive items if it is crucial to supporting local people e.g. minibus for elderly day care, equipment for a training room, community café fit out.
- Purchase of land or property with a minimum of a 25 year lease with a clear community benefit.

Total project costs must be above £30,000.

The deadline for applications is 30 June 2018.
