




The Wey Valley Methodist Circuit

A Message From Our Superintendent

Dear Friends,

I have been thinking about what the key is to a happy life. We know that life will always have its challenges, but some people never seem to let things get them down, whereas some of us ruminate on the negatives and forget the positives. I recently enjoyed a performance of Shakespeare's "Scottish play" at Chichester. Reading the programme, I was intrigued by an article on *hubris and nemesis*. Macbeth was certainly a victim to hubris – that over reaching pride which especially affects despots. He also fell foul of nemesis, that unseen hand of fate which, like the sword of Damocles, reminds tyrants of their precarious hold on power. The twentieth century is replete with examples of rulers who sought to impose their own will, but whose towering statues came crashing down. Clearly, exaggerated pride may give temporary satisfaction but the longer term prospects for happiness are not encouraging. Pride cometh before a fall.

Apparently, some toddlers go through a stage of being slightly despotic and going into a rage when their will is thwarted or misunderstood. It has been called "the terrible twos". With growing maturity there comes increased capacity to understand the perspective of others. Max Lucado in his recently published book, "How Happiness Happens", looks at the New Testament verses containing the words "one another" (see below for references). His premise is that happiness arises from the kindness, respect and understanding we show to others as Christians.

Much thought has been given to how we as Methodists can continue to show respect to those who hold contradictory convictions. What future generations will look back on and draw their own conclusions from is how we discuss: "God in Love Unites Us - The Report of the MARRIAGE and RELATIONSHIPS Task Group 2019 for study and prayerful discussion". We are asked to consult our churches regarding this report prior to our Spring Circuit Meeting. Whilst no votes are to be taken other than at Synod and Methodist Conference, it would be helpful if each church could send a narrative account of their consultation. These will be reported to Circuit Meeting and sent with any additional comments to Synod. Representatives to Conference will thus be informed of the views of the circuits, before voting according to their best judgement.

Copies of the report and study guide will be distributed with The Wey Forward. The proposed changes to our standing orders are clearly outlined in the report and are required reading for church members who wish to express an opinion on this. My prayer is that we approach this consultation so that we positively model a way of "living with contradictory convictions" in a world in which too often people debate personalities rather than issues. Whatever our views, may we never behave as if getting our own way is the path to happiness, and may we never forget that happiness comes from affording respect to others.

Finally, may I wish you God's richest blessing as we celebrate Christmas and renew our Covenant in the New Year.

Cranleigh

Since my last article, we in Cranleigh have had a rather busier time than usual! These busy times began on September 15 when we hosted a Circuit Service for the first time in many years. We were very pleased to do this as it was a special service for local preachers and included the celebration of 25 years as a local preacher for Rosemary Lee, who is well-known to us and is particularly remembered this year for the Mothering Sunday service she conducted at Elmbridge Village during our 'evacuation'. This Circuit Service was conducted by our minister and Circuit Superintendent Keith, assisted by retiring Local Preachers' Secretary Lyn Mckay. Local preacher trainer, Rev Allan Taylor, preached an inspiring sermon.

Only a fortnight later, on September 29, we were privileged to welcome Loughborough Male Voice Choir who performed the excellent concert they had been giving at various locations on the south coast – free of charge to us! The conductor, Chris Hill, a life-long Methodist, wanted to help a church in need of funds in our Circuit, as they broke their journey back to their home in Leicestershire. The audience was boosted by the choir's own supporters from Loughborough and by many friends from other local churches and from the village. A big thank you to our friends from the Circuit who kindly came to our church to support us in this venture. (My own thanks to our church members who helped with practical matters of organisation and with provision of refreshments – a marathon task!) To date, funds raised by retiring collection total over £500. It seems people were still donating after the event as they appreciated the wonderful standard and variety of the choir's performance.

Then – the Harvest weekend: The Supper (a 'Bring and Share' plus quiz) on Saturday October 5, enjoyed by the relatively few attenders, and the services on the following day. Both morning and evening services on the 6 October were conducted by Keith, the evening one being a Churches Together celebration, with a Songs of Praise format and a united choir. All local clergy participated and the organist was the Director of Music at St Nicolas Parish Church. Traditional harvest hymns were mostly chosen by participants from the four churches, though some were new to us!



And now for Christmas! Jane Briggs has already been sending out invitations for the Community Tea which we are once more able to host in our own premises on December 21. Our own choir, with guests, plan to perform our usual concert and encourage the audience to participate(!). We hope too that our recorders and perhaps other instruments may contribute as usual. Our traditional concert at Elmbridge will this year be on December 17 at 3pm. We hope to include audience participation in both these concerts – and of course our instrumentalists.

Meanwhile, usual weekly or fortnightly events continue: a small Fellowship Group hosted by Eric and Audrey Stoakes meets at Elmbridge on alternate Mondays; Friendly Voices every Tuesday afternoon meets at church for those for whom English is a foreign language (started originally for refugees, but now includes holiday makers, foreign local employees and others needing conversation practice), the fortnightly Wednesday (evening) group, weekly choir practice on Friday evenings, Saturday coffee mornings (please come and see us! 10.30am - 12noon). Plans for more fellowship/fun gatherings are in the pipeline!

The past seven years have been eventful and utterly worthwhile, serving in the old Guildford Circuit, and more recently in the Wey Valley Circuit. It has been a privilege to share in so many services and events throughout the circuit and to get to know people. It has also been immensely impressive to serve alongside so many talented and dedicated people, both ministerial and lay.

Like hundreds of other circuits at the moment, we face daunting challenges undreamed of fifty one years ago, when our national membership statistics were infinitely higher than they are now, as were, of course, our congregations, at both morning and evening services.

We cannot ignore the drastic changes that face us in the next two decades, but if Mr Wesley was right, in his final words on his death bed: "The best of all is God is with us"; then we have reason to live in hope.

Godalming United Church

During the summer break the musical Rowlings (our equivalent of the von Trapps, and all keen members of Godalming Band) accompanied the National Methodist Youth Band - motto Fun, Faith and Fellowship - on an expedition to Moldova, the tiny landlocked country between Romania and Ukraine. The band was invited by Love and Care for Moldova – a Horsham-based charity whose trustees include Hilary Strawson (Cranleigh Methodist Church). In Moldova they worked closely with La Via, a centre for vulnerable children. The band was accommodated at the Holy Trinity Centre in Chisinau, the capital. During their 10 day tour they performed in 6 concerts and 3 services around the country. Quiet times were spent studying "courage" as a Biblical theme.



In October we dispatched our 59th container full of supplies – mainly furniture for re-use – to schools in The Gambia. We've already started on the next container – thanks to the generosity of the older girls at St Hilary's School who collected school stationary supplies as their Harvest gifts. Our charitable link with West Africa goes back 35 years, and includes sponsoring young people through secondary & higher education as well as ongoing support for an ophthalmic unit.

On October 12 our Harvest Supper - fish & chips and a quiz – was heartily enjoyed by over 50 of the church family, and followed next morning by the annual Harvest Festival, conducted by our friend Rev Clive Chase, chaplain of Charterhouse School. Harvest offerings of non-perishable foodstuffs are being distributed by the Salvation Army in Guildford.

Nights are drawing in, and preparations are already in hand for our winter pantomime – The Wizard of Oz. Again it has been specially written by local lad Josh Dixon, with parts accommodating our various groups, ranging in age from 5 to "mature", making up a cast of approximately 50. Plenty of scope for everyone!

Guildford St Mary's

Improving a medieval building is proving an 'interesting' experience in so many ways. Any major building project comes with challenges but they also come with messages and lessons. When the excavations encounter skeletons buried some 900 years ago it reinforces our awe at the heritage we have inherited - worship and Christian witness on this site for so many centuries. When excavations around the columns show they have stood for centuries without the sorts of foundation one would expect these days, it's reassuring that the builders can quickly encircle them with concrete collars. And throughout the need for good communication.

At the heart of our ministry at St Mary's, and an enormous privilege, are the opportunities to engage with people, many of whom have little or no contact with any church. One might think that people would be put off by an entrance doubling up as a builders' yard, with the building shrouded by hoardings and scaffolding - in fact it provides another opportunity for engagement as passers-by are intrigued to know what is going on and display a remarkable readiness to weave their way through the builders' yard to reach our temporary main entrance. Indeed some, even from overseas, want to know when they can come back to see the finished works. Some questioned whether we should even bother to open for Heritage Weekend in September - the fact that over 300 people visited speaks for itself!

Even in the dark of night visitors come to share the spiritual experience of St Mary's at our monthly Night Vision (do drop in sometime) - usually the last Friday of the month from 8 pm to 11.30 pm but in December we plan to be open from 6 pm to 9 pm on Thursday 19 December to coincide with Christmas Late Night Shopping.

Some of you have shared the journey along our Easter Pathway; this Christmas we'll be unveiling another Pathway offering striking visual prompts to explore the events and significance of Christmas. You could perhaps drop in on New Year's Eve when we'll be open during the day.

At the time of writing we can see the welcome area and kitchen taking shape and our loyal congregation eagerly await the completion of the first phase with its improved facilities, most of all the recommissioning of heating. I suspect that people's seating preferences may change rapidly when underfloor heating is available in part of the church.

Writing recently our Rector quoted 'Take off your shoes - you stand on holy ground', referred to St Mary's as evident to all as sacred space and emphasised the need to make it accessible to all. Once the works are complete, those who do take off their shoes will find a warm floor for the first time in the building's 1000 years' history. Maybe then our hardy souls will be able to resort to just one pair of socks or normal tights!

Perhaps inevitably with such a project, the timeline has slipped and we're trying to gauge how it might affect our usual Advent activities so we'll publicise those on the Circuit website closer to the time. By the time of the next issue of Wey Forward, I hope we'll be able to share some pictures and welcome you to see the first stage of the new improved St Mary's, living up to the words of the hymn 'All are welcome in this place.'

Free Training and Support


Across our churches we have dedicated and willing volunteers who undertake all sorts of tasks; each one essential to enable our churches to offer worship Sunday by Sunday. However, the world in which we are asking our folk to do this requires us to demonstrate that they have been appropriately resourced - through training and support - to do the work.

The Circuit has purchased some on-line training from a company called iHasco so that people can enhance their skills and make sure that they are aware of best working practices and, in some cases, health and safety regulations.

The courses are generally quite short and they do not need to be completed all in one go. The tests at the end shouldn't be seen as anything daunting but as a way of measuring understanding of the course material. As well as being informative they are **FUN** and **FREE** to sign up for.

You can choose to complete any or all of the courses below—whichever would be helpful to you personally.

- Accident reporting
- Electrical safety
- Fire awareness
- Health and safety basics
- Ladder safety
- Working at height
- Manual handling
- Noise awareness
- Slips, trips and falls
- Cyber security awareness
- Display screen equipment
- Lone working in the workplace
- Bomb threats and suspicious packages
- Food allergy awareness
- Food safety and hygiene levels 1 and 2

Knaphill

Clothes4U, the Knaphill Methodist Church clothes bank, is approaching its 2nd anniversary and both visitor and volunteer numbers continue to grow. The September opening brought a queue of visitors waiting for Clothes4U to open, suggesting the posters displayed by many organisations in Surrey are working well. A new poster is circulated by email once a quarter showing the next three months' opening dates, and various schools, charities, local government facilities, churches, etc kindly print them out & display them.

The organisation of clothes bank open afternoons has changed, making better use of the church's space, giving visitors more room to choose their clothes, and allowing more time and space for volunteers to sort donated clothes and put them onto hangers. Another benefit seems to be that it encourages people to stay on and socialise over a cup of tea - a lot of Syrian visitors took the opportunity to do this in September. Everyone who visits is encouraged to have a drink and a piece of cake before they go.

Of course, the more visitors we have, the more clothes we give out, and the more we need to replenish our stock. This means we need to constantly renew our requests for donations, while bearing in mind the changing seasons. The best way for donors to supply clothes is to email clothes@knaphill-methodistchurch.com to find out when the church will be open, so that they don't have a wasted journey. One of the volunteers will reply to them and arrange a time. We particularly need Muslim women's traditional clothing for Woking's Syrian refugees. Woking is now home to many Syrian refugees, and a growing number of them visit the clothes bank. If anyone can help us out with donations, please do get in touch.

Clothes4U is always looking to add to its list of helpful organisations who can display posters and/or issue vouchers to people who need some clothes. Some of the volunteers have therefore agreed to start contacting additional charities, nurseries, churches, etc to ask if they would agree to be involved. Those volunteers will also be a useful point of contact for all organisations who work with us. We would like to provide some signposting to other services which visitors may find useful and research is starting - firstly to identify what services would be useful to know about, and then how best to provide the information. Examples of services we know about are the CAB's Energy Best Deal, (which offers help in understanding how to approach the energy market), food banks, and charities which can help with managing debt. There must be many useful services out there, although there will need to be some form of Arabic interpretation - so there is plenty to keep us busy.



As planned, the Church was gloriously decorated with flowers, greenery and fruit and vegetables grown by members of the congregation and our Sunday Morning worship was followed by a harvest lunch enjoyed by over fifty who tucked in to all the food provided by willing helpers. The congregation was also invited to bring food parcels to the service and these were distributed the following week. One of the very grateful recipients was the Mulberry House Hostel, a supported housing service in Guildford managed by the Salvation Army Housing Association, for young single women aged 18-35. The harvest gifts enabled them to fill up their store cupboards and give the young women interesting ingredients to use as they learn cooking skills. Other food parcels went to the Number 5 project - the emergency night hostel for the homeless who have 16 hungry people to feed every day.

Continuing the Harvest theme, our ecumenical Community Lunch Group has welcomed three new guests this term and we now host about eighteen to twenty guests each Tuesday. 8 October was a very special occasion when we welcomed Year 6 pupils from our local Bushy Hill School. The children arrived with a harvest box for each guest and shared a letter with them. The children had excellent communication skills and ensured everyone had a lot of fun. Those present said they all felt at least ten years younger at the end of the visit and are greatly looking forward to welcoming the pupils back to sing carols in December.




Guests enjoying our Community Lunch

US Cents Go Home to Loomis

Since August 1996 Guildford Cathedral has been running a scheme whereby the foreign currency it collects from visitors' donations is flown back to its home country in the luggage of friends and well-wishers travelling on holiday or business. To date nearly £20,000 has been raised. A while ago it was my turn, transporting 2 kilos of dollars to the USA. This is how it went.

My wife and I were visiting our daughter in western Canada. She lives in a small town just north of the border; so Washington State USA, lies just the other side. We made the crossing at Night Hawk – one of the smallest border posts along the whole frontier. Then south along the shore of Palmer Lake. In spring and summer the lake lies resplendent in its deep valley between the abruptly rising mountains of the East Cascades. The light glistens and gleams in the deep silence and the whole panorama of reflected mountains is one of majestic solitude. But catch Palmer on an off day and the splendour turns to desolation and a certain menace. The mountain ridges are hidden in lowering clouds and driving rain.

September that year we were lucky. We drove slowly in fine weather along the shoreline the twenty kilometres to the small settlement of Loomis. There's a church, with a diner opposite – a small, one-stop supermarket cum café. For such a small place, it's quite busy.




"What can I do for you folks?" asks the lady counter-assistant. "Could you do us a favour and change some wrapped coin?" I produce the cardboard tubes of one cent, five cent and ten cent pieces shipped from Guildford, in all twenty-four dollars. "You brought that load of metal from *England*? What's it for?" I try to bring into the remote heart of rural Washington the needs and aspirations of our Surrey cathedral. I touch briefly on the recent scheme to remove asbestos in the plaster, the need for funds, the restoration of the organ. But she's doing lunches, so she interrupts. "I'll ask". She

disappears behind a counter display and asks her husband, who is busy producing burgers and sandwiches. He calls back: "Is it American?" "Yes", I say. He responds: "Take it".

So the tubes of coin crossed the counter of the Loomis diner, and I was holding twenty-four dollar bills in my hand. After lunch we retraced our steps back into Canada and four weeks later, back in Guildford, the sterling equivalent was entered into the Cathedral's accounts.



Trinity's Stained Glass Window



Many readers will be familiar with our stained glass window at Trinity. We are shortly to have some repairs carried out to it and having become involved with that I have researched, with the help of others, its history.

The window was commissioned by the architect for the church, Edward D Mills & Partners. It was designed by Miss Gillian Rees Thomas who worked with Mills on a number of other Methodist church projects. Her work is recorded in the Victoria and Albert Museum where there is a picture of the window and a short note describing her as the finest Methodist stained glass craftswoman. It notes that, as in Woking, "Methodist stained glass is now generally more abstract than representational".

The brochure issued at the time of the opening of the Church in 1965 explains that the design is based on John Wesley's words "I look upon all the world as my parish". It states: "The cross represents the teaching of Christ spreading out towards the four corners of the earth; the cross flows into the chalice, signifying the fulfilment of man's desire for the blessing of God; the central symbol incorporates the loving eye of God and the sun, the Light of the World." Miss Thomas died in 2010.

Edward Mills was a committed Methodist. His father and grandfather were involved in construction and he started his career as an architect in 1930, aged 15. At Regent Street Polytechnic, he switched his allegiance from Lutyens to Le Corbusier, and began a collaboration with E. Maxwell Fry, who was himself in the process of discovering modern architecture. His practice was involved mainly with industrial and public buildings including a number of Methodist churches - and the Anglican Cathedral at Mbale in Uganda, which bears a striking resemblance to Trinity.

Tales of a Travelling Preacher

In the fifth, and penultimate, of a series Graham Warr looks back on his life

I was planned to preach at HMP Send on 2 November 1997, Christine and I had a rare weekend break and as the service was at 6.15pm we planned a day out. We left early for our trip to Bicester and intended to leave in good time to get to Send. We had a lovely morning and an enjoyable lunch and then we noticed that it was getting cold and misty. We cut our visit short and started our journey back. As we drove over the Chiltern Hills and into the Thames Valley a fog began to build up and by the time we got off the M25 it was a real 'peasouper'. We crawled in ever increasing darkness towards the prison. Our arrival was truly Dickensian as we arrived outside the huge locked gates which came looming out of the fog. Christine waited until I had rung the bell and was admitted. I waved to her as the gate was locked behind me. She was not allowed to accompany me and had arranged to visit a friend.

I still have the Order of Service and the sermon notes – today they don't seem appropriate -but at the end of the service most of the prisoners thanked me and gave the impression they enjoyed the worship. They certainly sang lustily!

As preachers and followers of Jesus we rarely see the results of our labours but one young man spoke to me at the end of the service. He was there for drug related offences and accepted that he had deserved his sentence, but he wanted to get his 'A' levels and go to university. His aim was to get a Social Work qualification and help other young people to avoid the path he had taken. I prayed with him and suggested he talk to the Prison Education Officer.

I was planned again on the 26 April 1998. The weather was very Spring like and I had planned a service based on the Good Shepherd. On the Saturday night the Minister at Walton-on-Thames, who was the Free Church Chaplain, rang me to 'let me know' that the Home Office had decided earlier in the week to close the prison and re-open it as a women's prison. Some of the prisoner had already been transferred. He warned me that some of the men were very unhappy and there could be a larger and perhaps resentful congregation. It was too late to change anything, but how great is our God, in the circumstances what better theme could there be than the one I had planned, The Good Shepherd.

I did make a couple of alterations which would not affect the organist. I added two unaccompanied solos –

'Do not be afraid, for I have redeemed you' and an old Salvation Army standard,

'Unto thee will I cry,

Shepherd hear my prayer,

Poor and needy am I,

Shepherd hear my prayer,

Deep is calling unto deep,

Rugged are the heights and steep,

Guide my steps, and keep,

Shepherd, hear, oh hear my prayer.'

We sang: 'To God be the glory, great things he has done', 'The King of Love my Shepherd is', 'Blessed Assurance', 'Jesus is mine', and 'Guide me, O thou great Jehovah'.

I had a list of those who were moving the next day and we prayed for them by name.

The theme of the sermon became 'New Opportunities' and was based on Psalm 23:6

'I know that your goodness and love will be with me all my life and I will live with you forever.'

At the end of the service the response from the men was one of thanks and gratitude. It was very humbling, for I knew I was going home to my wife and children but they had no idea where they were going tomorrow.

The young man, from last time, came to tell me that he was retaking his 'A' levels and had received a conditional offer of a university place. I don't know what happened to him, but I often think of him and pray that he is still with the Good Shepherd. That night I felt and saw God's love at work and the compassion of the Lord Jesus and power of the Holy Spirit in the congregation and myself too.

I preached twice more at HMP Send when it was re-opened as a women's prison. Sadly, the chapel was being renovated and was not in use. The congregation was small, and the services were in a corner of the Library. Many of the other prisoners were in another section and it was very difficult. I heard and felt some antagonism and abuse to me as a representative male. I felt for them because of what men had done to many of them. They were probably the most difficult services I have ever led. Nevertheless, God enabled me to share his gospel of love.

In 2000 HMP Send did not appear on the plan again.

For the last eighteen years the ageing and shrinking congregations have become even more apparent. As a preacher the message has subtly changed. I always keep a Children's item available but often don't use it. Sometimes there may be one or two little ones and I do take a story and often one of my puppets just in case.

Recently I have been asked to preach at the Chinese Congregation that worships at Woking Trinity on Sunday afternoons. I had no idea what to expect the first time I preached. Simon, one of the leaders, led me by the hand, and with the exchange of many emails between us I prepared a sermon for him to translate before the service.

I was very nervous but the service went very well. Our great God had prepared me for this experience because as a Heritage Steward at Wesley's Chapel I had conducted groups from Korea and South America who used a translator and I understood how it worked. I was conscious that a fifteen-minute sermon in English, with a translator takes roughly thirty minutes.

The congregation seemed very happy and it was a wonderful experience. When I asked Simon how it worked for him, he smiled, and said, "It was very good, but a bit short, we usually have a longer sermon in Chinese without any translation. It is not often a preacher is told the sermon was a bit short.

I have been preaching there a couple of times a year since and I enjoy the challenge, the wonderful welcome, the sincerity of the congregation, the joy in their worship but especially that little cup of green tea, slipped into my hand after the sermon. So, refreshing!



The new Circuit has brought more travelling and the opportunities to explore new ways of worship and I am back as a bit more of a travelling preacher. However, the Gospel has not changed but how it is presented has and I have been challenged to present it in different ways for different congregations.



House Groups and the Growth of Christianity in China

At Walton we have found that the series of Bible studies written for small groups by Hilary Brand are particularly popular. We have used those based on the films "The King's Speech", "Chocolat", "Les Miserables" and "The Theory of Everything". House groups were an important part of early Methodism and for the last 50 years have played a significant role in the growth of Christianity in China. Remarkably, the most rapid growth coincided with the Communist government challenging the belief in God by letting the "Red guards" shut all Christian churches during the "Cultural revolution" of 1966-1976. Christians then met only in small groups, mostly in houses which must have been conducive to building up and sharing their faith together with their joys and sorrows.

The money collected for refreshments after morning services at Walton goes to selected charities. For example, in October it went to The Bible Society and in December it will go to Action For Children. In the latest edition of the Bible Society magazine "Word in Action", there is an article about the church in China. They estimate that there are now "well over 100 million Christians" in China, which agrees well with the graph on this page which I completed some 20 years ago, based on 23 estimates from a variety of sources. A fleet of 48 vans now distributes Bibles from the Amity Printing Company in Nanjing, to more than 60,000 churches throughout China. Over the past 20 years some of us in Walton have contributed to the Bible Society's programme to purchase paper to print Bibles in Nanjing. About 4 million Bibles in Chinese now come off their press every year to help satisfy the longing to know more about Jesus.

The communists combined all Protestant denominations into one church but found it impossible to combine them with Roman Catholics. Around 1930 there were about 8.000 Protestant missionaries in China, including my father. At that time, members of Methodist churches, led by missionaries from the UK, USA and Canada, comprised about 18 out of every 100 Chinese Christians. We can rejoice that Methodists have played such a big role in the massive growth of the church there. After 1970 the unregistered churches started to grow very quickly,



some being led by people with a Methodist background.

Now about one in every 10 people in China is a Christian. It is difficult to estimate the precise number as churches have their own methods of counting adherents. Some quote members, others those who attend, and some quote the much larger church community. Much of the above information was obtained from the missionary library of the University of London's School of Oriental and African Studies. We can rejoice that the Christian church continues to grow in many areas, especially in parts of South America, Africa and Asia.
