'The living and the dead: exploring minority burial grounds in Brookwood Cemetery'

Surrey Heritage is a partner in a new 2-year project, led by Woking Asian Business Forum (WABF), aimed at exploring and documenting minority burial grounds in Brookwood Cemetery, Woking. Awarded £93,400 by the National Lottery Heritage Fund, the project will significantly adding to our knowledge of the cemetery burial communities and the resulting research will be made accessible on our Exploring Surrey's Past website.



Unknown to most, Brookwood Cemetery is host to the highest concentration of minority burial grounds in the UK. Apart from a wide range of Muslim burial grounds, these include the first Zoroastrian burial ground established in Europe, as well as Swedish, Latvian and Serbian grounds, to name but a few. These burial grounds constitute an important part of Brookwood Cemetery, and they represent a unique cultural heritage that has so far remained undocumented.

WABF, working with Surrey History Centre, Brookwood Cemetery Society and The Lightbox, will collect information concerning the history and rituals relating to the burial grounds, and make it widely available. An app will also be developed enabling visitors to Brookwood Cemetery to access information about the minority burial ground while visiting the cemetery. Additional outputs include a documentary, an exhibition at The Lightbox, oral history interviews, and thematic walks in collaboration with Brookwood Cemetery Society.

The project will be managed by Woking-based social researcher Ole Jensen, who has supported us with previous outreach work, and he'll be working with local stakeholders and volunteers. More details about the project can be found at the website of <u>Woking Asian Business Forum</u>.

"The Future of Interreligious Dialogue" - Essay Competition

The World Council of Churches (WCC) has announced an essay competition for youth who want to reflect on the theme "The Future of Interreligious Dialogue." The contest marks the 50th anniversary of the WCC's Office of Interreligious Dialogue and Cooperation.

The contest aims to encourage people under the age of 30 with interests in the field of interreligious relations and engagement to develop and share their ideas on different subjects such as: Christian theologies of interreligious engagement; some aspect of another religious tradition which is relevant to its relationship to Christianity; religious pluralism more widely; or the theory or practice of interreligious dialogue. Essays may also reflect on interreligious cooperation for the sake of the common good; or the World Council of Churches and interreligious relations.

Rise in Computer Software Fraud

Fraudsters are taking advantage of the COVID-19 pandemic to commit Computer Software Service Fraud (CSSF), as the UK public continue to stay at home and utilise the internet more as a result of ongoing restrictions.

2,007 reports were made to Action Fraud in November 2020 in relation to CSSF, with a total loss of £2,148,976. This is a 22% increase in reporting compared to the previous month.

Suspects cold call victims, or use a 'pop up' window, purporting to be calling from well-known broadband providers primarily, claiming that victims have problems with their computers, routers, or internet.

The suspect persuades the victim to download and connect via a Remote Access Tool (RAT), allowing the suspect to gain access to the victim's computer or mobile phone. Victims are persuaded to log into their online banking to receive a refund as a form of compensation, allowing the suspect access to the victim's bank account, and the ability to move funds out of the victims account into a UK mule account.

There has also been an increase in the variety of service providers being impersonated, with multiple providers being affected.

What you need to do:

Always remember:

- Genuine organisations would never contact you out of the blue to ask for personal or financial
- details, such as your PIN or full banking password.
- Never install any software, or grant remote access to your computer, because of a cold call.
- Don't contact companies promoting tech support services via browser pop-ups.

• Hang up on any callers that claim they can get your money back for you.

If you have been a victim:

If you have made a payment, contact your bank immediately. They can help you prevent any further losses.

If you granted remote access to your computer, seek technical support to remove any unwanted
software. If you need tech advice, look for reviews online first or ask friends for recommendations

Frustrations of adapting to digital interactions

For many of us, this has been a year of rapid adaptation. Most significantly, adapting to a digital way of interacting with one another. As an organisation that is all about 'face-to-face encounter' and immersive residential experiences, it has been a fascinating journey to question how we can respond with integrity to the change of circumstances and shifting needs of those we exist to serve. We resisted jumping on the digital bandwagon before spending a good amount of time questioning 'to what extent is our work even possible online?' Is it possible to build trust across difficult divides in a virtual environment rather than a shared physical space?

We had already started a process of distilling the essence of our approach to reconciliation into 12 actionable habits, which we have enjoyed sharing in its most simple form through our <u>Habit Advent Calendar</u> and in its fuller form through our virtual programme journey. And we had already started to think about how we could develop a digital platform to support the ongoing collaboration of our global network beyond their residential experience. These projects have ended up being well timed for the necessary migration to the digital domain and have led to creative ways of developing some digital programming that remains rooted in our DNA. Our approach to 'digitalisation' has not been to try and replicate what we do online, but rather to reconsider how we can bring people together across divides in the new landscape that COVID-19 has revealed. In the same way that needs are always changing over time, it has been good to be present to and respond to this year's changes in the world around us.

Stay safe and avoid waiting in A&E - just call 111 first

People in Surrey who need urgent NHS care are being asked to call NHS 111 before they decide to walk into the local Emergency Department (ED), or as many people know it, A&E.

The new approach will ensure that patients can access the clinical service they need, first time. It will help to us to maintain social distancing, reduce the risk of spreading Covid-19 and keep patients and staff as safe as possible.

To ensure social distancing in the emergency department waiting areas people with urgent, but not lifethreatening, health problems are being asked to contact NHS 111 before attending. NHS 111 will provide help straight away; if you need urgent care they will book you in so you can be seen quickly and safely. They may signpost you to an alternative service where you can access the right care in the right place.

Surrey Heartlands will go-live on 1 December as part of the national roll out.

This is about making it easier for our patients to access the right care quickly and, importantly, keeping them safe during the pandemic. This winter it is crucial that we carefully manage the numbers of people in our emergency department and calling NHS 111 first can help to prevent overcrowding. This is specifically for people who are not in serious danger but need urgent attention. The fastest way to get the right care is to contact NHS 111.

They will be spoken to by a trained professional and a clinician if needed. If it is decided you need to go to the emergency department then you will be given a suitable time to attend and staff at the hospital will be expecting you. That means less waiting around and faster treatment.

Nationally around 70 per cent of people attending emergency departments had just walked in and the majority of those could have been seen through other services such as the urgent treatment centres, GP or even pharmacy.
