

I have been pondering (as no doubt many of you have) the recent passing of the Queen and the extraordinary scenes that came out of that event. There's a lovely quotation from the Queen that has given me cause to think - 'I have to be seen to be believed'. She was aware that the idea of monarchy is one thing but the reality of seeing the monarch is another thing entirely.

As we move towards Christmas and this extraordinary story of a God who comes to us I think this quote has a huge amount to teach us. I for one will miss the Queen's presence on Christmas Day. I am sure that our new King will do a splendid job of the Christmas Day broadcast but memories of the Queen, year after year (and perhaps even more so recently) being really clear about the Christian message of Christmas and the story of wise visitors, shepherds, angels and a baby being born to save us will live with me for a long time.

Her clarity about what Christmas celebrates was always one of my joys on Christmas Day.

'I have to be seen to be believed'. Our faith in Christ is of a God who comes to us - who lives life as one of us - with all that that means. This is not a God who is remote or far away but a God who is born into poverty, becomes a refugee, who is earthy and 'of us'. It is an extraordinary truth when you think about it.

And today - ours are the hands, the feet, the mouths, the actions through which that God speaks. So as I travel around the Circuit - as I see so much great work being done I am so incredibly moved by the knowledge that Jesus is being seen and experienced in so many ways around the Circuit. That the life and love of Jesus is being encountered by so many people because of us. 'I have to be seen to be believed' - every day the incarnate Jesus is being seen and believed in because of us and what we do. May that long continue to be the case.

Have a truly blessed Advent and Christmas time.



We may extend Tuesdays to include a warm bank whereby local people can come into the church for a day to keep warm and to save their own heating bills at home. We are working alongside the local Baptist church and the community centre, so we all do a day each and spread the time, effort, cost, etc. and provide a service to the local community.

Our services at Elmbridge Retirement Village continue to be very popular. We had one on the morning of the Jubilee Sunday, incorporating our own church service, and we had over 60 people attend. Our recent harvest festival service, followed by supper, was led by our honorary Chaplain Rev Allan Taylor and again over 50 people contributed to the tins, packets, boxes and fresh fruit and vegetable donations which filled my car boot! The fresh produce went to the local day centre and the other donations were gratefully received by the food bank in Cranleigh.

- 2. I am happy to 'lead' the group but it does not mean that I have any 'expert' knowledge of the Bible. There is no such thing as a 'stupid' question we are all here to learn from each other and the Bible.
- 3. If you do not wish to read out loud or speak there will be no pressure on you to do so.

Please seriously consider coming to this group as it will be a good way of increasing your knowledge of the Word of God and learning how to apply it to modern life. It will also help develop fellowship with fellow Christians!

All are welcome, whether you worship at Merrow or not.



South East District Synod, 24 September 2022

It was the Wey Valley Circuit's turn to host the District Synod this year and Trinity Methodist Church in Woking did a superb job on our behalf. Presbyters, deacons and lay members from across the District - which includes Gibraltar and Malta as well as Kent, Sussex, Surrey and small sections of Berkshire and Hampshire - started to gather from 9.30am for breakfast and the opportunity to meet up with friends and colleagues. The day included a little business, a lot of sharing of information and time for worship. After welcomes from Paul, on behalf of the Circuit, and Sam, on behalf of Trinity we had a lovely un-rushed communion service led by Rev Dr David Hinchliffe, our District Chair. When there is a lot to be said and done, I am grateful that plenty of time is given for worshipping together particularly for those who are usually called to lead worship.

After more coffee, the guest speaker, Rev Andy Fishburne, who is part of the Connexion's Evangelism and Growth Team gave a presentation entitled *Minding the Gap*, a new way of exploring the excellent Methodist Way of Life (MWOL) material. A Methodist Way of Life identifies twelve practices that help us grow as disciples both as individuals and as a church. Hopefully you will have received the little MWOL card that is distributed with our membership tickets. The diagram below summarises each practice in one key word and suggests possible links between them creating something that looks like a rather busy train network. We were encouraged to consider our commitment to each station, what our individual home station might be and how this links with other stations our churches are good at, and which stations need more development. This may sound rather complicated but it helped us to reflect and appreciate our interconnectedness and seemed exciting and liberating!

Godalming United Church

At the beginning of August the National Methodist Youth Brass Band made our premises their base for their summer tour of the South Coast – *Bandstand to Beaches*. The Rowling family (GUC's answer to the Von Trapps) all take part, and this outline is taken from Eloise's contribution to our church magazine.

Starting on the Isle of Wight, the first five days were based at Ryde Methodist Church. One of the Band's chaplains led Sunday morning worship, assisted by members contributing readings, prayers and testimony. The following week, the mainland base was Offington Park Methodist Church, with concerts in Hove, Eastbourne and Hastings. Leading Sunday worship at Offington, members reflected on their study theme of the week – the story of Joseph. This not only chimed in with their collective love of the Andrew Lloyd Webber music – but pointed to God's plan for Joseph, His plan for all of us, and the theme of Welcoming.

The Band's autumn fixtures include 3Generate - the Methodist Church Youth Assembly - and a weekend in Stamford in November.

We went ahead with our charity cream tea on Saturday 10 September – feeling that following the late Queen's death people would appreciate the opportunity to sign our foyer condolences book and have a gentle chat. £411 was raised, meaning that 27 Gambians will have their sight saved.

Harvest Festival on Sunday 2 October was a joyful occasion, followed by a bring-and-share lunch – the first for three years.

Following the disastrous floods in Pakistan we held a retiring collection for Christian Aid for three weeks starting on 18 September.

During September and October Adam led a twice-weekly Bible study – "Basics of Christianity" – something for all, from newer Christians to "veterans".

In a world of uncertainty, where do we stand?

In this deeply unpredictable phase the world is going through, it's incredibly difficult in late September to predict what will be topical and on our hearts in December.

I would like to think that there will be no need by then for our weekly Vigils for Ukraine but sadly that is not looking likely. When we started them back in February immediately following the invasion, we had no idea that they would be running for months on end but they have met a need right through the summer and into the autumn, with well over 2,300 people having attended by September. Each week there is something to touch the heart or inspire the team, sometimes even to amuse – like how do we record the attendance of a fox who ventured through the doors of the church (not very far, fortunately)?

Or the young couple passing by between hostelries who doubted they would be welcome in church, having had a few drinks, and needed some support (moral, they could still walk) to enter the church but came out some minutes later, full of appreciation. The icing on that cake was that, a few minutes later, when they'd met up with friends at our nearest pub, the young man felt moved to come back bringing another friend so she could light a candle. That turned into a conversation with the man about his mother, who is training for the priesthood, and his surprise at the amount she is expected to do in her training. When asked if he was supporting her in her training, he said he was probably showing her 'a different side of life'. I'd love to know if he's told her of his visit.

I would like to think the cost of living crisis will have been solved, or at least eased, so that millions will be spared the worry of how to pay their bills or to choose between heat and food. Sadly, that too seems almost inconceivable but I hope St Mary's and our other churches in Guildford and the Circuit will be able to play a role in keeping people warm and welcome during the coldest months, as well as helping with Foodbanks.

It would be nice to think that politicking could ease and our elected representatives clearly work together for the good of all by December but I won't hold my breath for that one either.

Fortunately there is a certainty of something to look forward to – the Good News of Christmas that we are called to share and which remains a solid, reliable promise. In the build up to Christmas we will again hold a series of 3 Thursday lunchtime Advent Reflections, starting on 1 December, and look forward to seeing friends from around the Circuit joining us. This time our reflections will be centred around some images from the Methodist Modern Art Collection, and then followed by Carols at Lunchtime on 22 December. Watch out for more details.

Christmas is not just a time to celebrate but also to reinvigorate our faith and our readiness to share it, maybe by word but certainly by deed. So whether the need is concern for peace in Ukraine or elsewhere, or to ease the lot of those struggling with finance, to welcome strangers or any other need, let us all be renewed in our desire to show the love of Christ - for there is another certainty - that there will be plenty in need of Christ's love.

Sadly, that is not to be, because they have found an alternative venue where they will not need to pack away equipment every day and are able to have longer sessions. St Michael's, Sheerwater

Plans for the refurbishment and extension at St Michael's Community Hub are gathering pace. We hope to go to planning before this magazine is published and then, alongside finalising the detail of our plans, we'll have the daunting task of packing away and storing everything in the church building. It's a good time to turf out cupboards, use up supplies and resist buying anything new! We hope to be leaving the building for a few months after Easter 2023 IF all goes to plan.

What then? Well, our expectation is that we will use the community centre and the MASCOT (Maybury and Sheerwater Community Trust) Hub and work flexibly until we can return to our building. The pandemic has at least taught us that we don't always need a building to be church. We will have to do things differently for a while, but we have some idea of how that might work now.



In the meantime, our community work continues: Pop up café for Primary School age children and their carers is hugely popular and we know that the food, games and craft are valued by all the families we see. The growing team of volunteers include Woking Borough Council employees who value the time to connect with families on the estate. With the help of the Church of the Good Shepherd in Pyrford, Tots Praise is off to a good start, and we hope to build on that by improving our advertising. Our great value community lunches happen each month (where else could you get a 2-course home-cooked meal for \pounds 6?) and it won't be long before we're planning our annual Christmas feast. St Michael's is never knowingly under catered!

Following the Cost of Living Summit that Woking Borough Council ran recently in our brand-new leisure centre on the estate, all our community partners are aware of just how important safe, warm space is going to be this winter. Sheerwater is one of the targeted areas for specific winter pressures funding so Sheerwater Together (local residents and partnership organisations) will be making sure there are warm hubs with fun things to do, for free, across our community this winter. St Michael's, MASCOT, Eastwood Leisure and Parkwood Community centres will be sharing the funding to pay for things like heating and refreshments, crafts and games – all to be agreed at our mid-October meeting and underway by 1 November.

I consider all this to be at the heart of the good news we seek to share day by day as a church. As James says, 'Dear friends, do you think you'll get anywhere...if you learn all the right words but never do anything? Does merely talking about faith indicate that a person really has it? For instance, you come upon an old friend dressed in rags and half-starved and say, 'Good morning, friend! Be clothed in Christ! Be filled with the Holy Spirit!' and walk off without providing so much as a coat or a cup of soup – where does that get you? Isn't it obvious that God-talk without God-acts is outrageous nonsense?' Reflections on the Wey Valley Pilgrimage to the Holy Land - May 2022

All agreed that one of the most prayerful and spiritual places where we felt close to Jesus was on the shores of the Sea of Galilee as we shared Holy Communion. This was the site where the risen Jesus appeared to his disciples as they were fishing and cooked breakfast for them. Surrounded by the peace and tranquility of this holy place, we could imagine Jesus standing on this same beach, sharing a meal with his disciples as we were sharing bread and wine.

Although the Church of the Nativity in Bethlehem and the Holy Sepulchre in Jerusalem were busy, crowded sites, there was still an overpowering sense of the continuing presence of God. 2000 years of worship and prayers of faithful Christians permeated the stones of these historic churches, and other beautiful churches we visited. The Garden of Gethsemane with its ancient olive trees, the Shepherds' Fields on the edge of Bethlehem, the High Priest's House where Jesus was brought before Caiaphas – all these places and more brought Jesus' ministry to life as we read the relevant gospel passages and prayed together. Bassam, our Palestinian Christian guide, took us to look down on the ancient trackway in a deep gorge marking the way to Jerusalem from Jericho. The scenery seemed unchanged since Jesus' time. This might easily have been the road on which the Good Samaritan stopped to help the injured traveller.

There were many other aspects to this pilgrimage which impacted us and transformed our understanding of Jesus – too many to include here. One happy and lasting effect was the friendship we formed between us all, across ages, different churches and even denominations. If you do get the chance to hear any of the pilgrims speak about their pilgrimage, please do go and listen. It might prompt you to go on pilgrimage too!

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


The church family shared a buffet lunch after Harvest worship.
