A Message From Our Superintendent

He was such a busy person - reading his journals is an exercise in breathlessness - but note - he underpinned everything with enormous amounts of prayer - rising very early every morning to do so.

Commit to prayer. Practice it, experiment with it ... be creative with it and you will find it an enormous source of strength and power. May we be a Circuit - may yours be a Church - that takes prayer seriously and that does nothing without it.

Let each one of us encourage each other in prayer and start that by selecting five people (perhaps those on the outside edges of the Church) that you will pray for from 18 to 28 May.

Just before I go I did also want to take this opportunity to give a huge word of personal and grateful thanks to Sue Howson. Sue has been Circuit Administrator for six years and her calm, efficient, wise words and work have been of immense value to so many across our Circuit Churches. A Brand Plucked From The Burning

Part of early Methodist legend is when John Wesley nearly died at age six, when the parsonage burned down. The entire family had escaped except for John who was trapped upstairs in his bedroom with fire surrounding him. John climbed up to the window and neighbours formed a human ladder to pull the boy to safety just as the roof collapsed.

Wesley always felt he was providentially spared to fulfil his ministerial calling and took the phrase "a brand plucked from the burning" to remember the event. The phrase is taken from Zechariah 3:2. Early Methodists took the phrase and began to use it as a metaphor for evangelical conversion.

Although many people are aware of the story, few know its details. Fortunately, we have a vivid first-hand account from John's mother Susanna, written on 14 February 1709, only five days after the fire.

Susanna wrote to her eldest son Samuel, Jr. about the fire and how they all escaped. Samuel was away attending school at Westminster. For some background, John was called "Jacky" by his family. After some introduction in her letter, Susanna informs her eldest son of the details of the fire:

"I suppose you already heard of the firing of our house by what accident we cannot imagine, but the fire broke out about eleven or twelve o' clock at night, we being all in bed; nor did we perceive it till the roof of the corn chamber was burnt through and the fire fell upon your sister Hetty's bed, which stood in the little room joining upon it. She waked and immediately ran to call your father, who lay in the red chamber, for I being ill, he was forced to lie from me. He says he heard some crying fire in the street before, but did not apprehend where 'twas till he opened his door. He called at our chamber and bid us all shift for life, for the roof was falling fast and nothing but thin wall kept the fire from the staircase."

"We had no time to take our clothes, but ran all naked. I called Betty to bring the children out of the nursery. She took Patty and left Jacky to follow her. But he, going to the door and seeing all on fire, ran back again. We got the street door open, but the wind drove the flame with such violence that none could stand against it. I tried thrice to break through, but was driven back. I made another attempt and waded through the fire, which did me no other hurt than scorch my legs and face."

"When I was in the yard, I looked about for your father and the children, but seeing none, concluded 'em all lost. But I thank God, I was mistaken! Your father carried sister Emily, Sukey and Patty into the garden; then missing Jacky, he ran back by the flame; then he thought him lost and commended his soul to God and went to look after the rest. The child (Jacky) climbed up to a window and called out to them in the yard; they got up the casement and pulled him out just as the roof fell into the chamber. Harry broke the glass of the parlour window and threw out your sisters Molly and Hetty, and so by God's great grace we all escaped. Don't be discouraged. God will provide for you."





Guildford St Mary's

Apart from a little use of items from the Methodist Modern Art Collection, I have to confess that until recently art featured little in the life of Guildford Methodist Church. Since our move to St Mary's, that has changed dramatically, partly because we are so much more involved in seeking ways to engage with a wide range of people and partly because of the opportunities the building itself offers. You will have seen before invitations to some of the exhibitions we have hosted and to some of our Reflections which use the creative arts as an inspiration and have enriched our consideration of faith issues.

Leading up to Pentecost we are taking part alongside several other churches in the Guildford area in a Pilgrim Art Walk - but you don't have to walk between the churches if you prefer not! Our contributions at St Mary's include five paintings by artist Stephen Kinder, including one symbolising Christ washing the feet of a disciple which absolutely grabbed people's attention during Holy Week. We will also be sharing a wood carving of a mother and child created by the late Stanley Weddle, a Methodist local preacher.

The building itself contributes some fine artwork in the form of stained-glass windows; again not something Methodist Churches typically major on. The window we brought with us from the 1960s Methodist building, symbolising the Crosses of Calvary, obviously has a high place in our affection but is only one of a great collection of windows spanning several centuries and a range of different styles. The most recent window was dedicated only in March, having been donated and installed in late 2022 in memory of a past worshipper. It signifies the Tree of Life and features key phrases from Lord of the Dance. To be honest, when I saw the artist's paper mock-up beforehand, I was a little lukewarm but now I have seen how her skill translated from paper to glass, and speaks to those coming into the church, I am thrilled. It is the second window in the church created by artist Mollie Meager. Do come along and see it when you can. (Photo on page 22).

Life at St Mary's continues apace. We are developing the Pop-Up Play Cafe concept and are really pleased by its progress. Having started with Saturday sessions, it was suggested by one of our ChitChat attenders that a weekday morning in school holidays might encourage greater attendance and that has certainly proved true. There was a real buzz at our Easter Week one, with the church full of children, parents, a very grateful grandfather and a number of other guests unaccompanied by children. These are open to all ages and our next one is due on Wednesday 31 May - we'd love you to drop in for a coffee.

Sadly the continuing war in Ukraine means that we continue our weekly Friday night Vigil which has now been attended by over 4,000 visitors, with some very moving stories we could tell. Most touching are the visits by Ukrainians themselves who are so grateful the suffering in their country is not forgotten. The Vice President of Conference is due to visit on the evening of 19 May as part of his visit to the SE District.




Sainte-Mère-Église

Sainte-Mère-Église is a village in the north western area of Normandy in France.

The village played a significant part in the World War II Normandy landings because of its position in the middle of route N13, which the Germans used to counterattack the troops landing on Utah and Omaha Beaches. In the early morning of 6 June 1944 mixed units of the U.S. 82nd Airborne and U.S. 101st Airborne Divisions occupied the village making it one of the first villages liberated in the invasion.

A well-known incident involved paratrooper John Steele of the 505th Parachute Infantry Regiment, whose parachute caught on the spire of the village church. He hung there for two hours, pretending to be dead until the Germans took him prisoner. Steele later escaped and re-joined his regiment. The incident was portrayed in the 1962 film *The Longest Day* by actor Red Buttons. Today you will find a dummy parachutist, as a memorial, dangling from the church spire.



Inside the church you will find this stained glass window, which was replaced after 1946. It is dedicated to the troops, particularly the parachutists, who liberated the village in 1944.

My photograph isn't great but if you look hard you will notice that the window depicts some parachutists. Fresh lilies are placed in a vase under the window at all times as constant Thank you.

The memorial outside, facing the main door of the church, has the famous John Maxwell Edmonds epitaph inscribed in it

When you go home Tell them of us and say For your tomorrow We gave our today.

Knaphill

At the time of writing this, we are gearing up for Christian Aid Week at KMC. This year, CAW takes place between 14 and 20 May and we will be doing our best to raise funds by a church collection, house to house collecting and a box collection at the Goldsworth Park shopping centre on Saturday 13 May, as we have done for many years now.

We marked Easter in several ways in Knaphill. At KMC, we held a simple Maundy Thursday meal accompanied by a prayerful reflection. On Good Friday, we joined with members from the other Knaphill churches in a silent Walk of Witness through the village. We started at St Hugh's Roman Catholic Church, with a bible reading, then set off to walk to Holy Trinity Parish Church at the other end of the village, stopping at KMC and Knaphill Baptist Church on the way for further readings. Two volunteers carried a large wooden cross as we walked.

A short ecumenical service then took place at Holy Trinity, after which we gathered for refreshments – hot cross buns, naturally. It has been good to be able to resume this witness after an enforced break during Covid-19 lockdowns. On Easter Sunday Rev Peter Hills came to KMC to celebrate Holy Communion with us.

Clothes4U has continued to operate on the third Saturday afternoon each month and has been well attended on most occasions. This generates mixed feelings. We are, of course, very pleased that we can help people obtain good quality, attractive clothing without cost, but are very aware that more people coming probably reflects a greater number of people in need. At least when they come to us they are in a warm space and can enjoy browsing for items that appeal. They can also enjoy a drink, a biscuit or two and a chance to sit and chat, or play, according to age. The next session is 2.00pm - 4.00pm on 17 June.

Coffee Mornings have also continued successfully, with bacon butties being a magnetic attraction for many! We thank Linda Todd for being able and willing to produce them. The next ones will be 10.00am - 12 noon on 24 June and 22 July.

Another big event will be Tarina Berry's next Coffee Morning in aid of Kent, Surrey and Sussex Air Ambulance Trust. This is to be held on Saturday 9 September, between 10.00am - 12 noon, and will have a variety of stalls and some lovely raffle and tombola prizes.

A regular event at KMC is our monthly prayer meeting by Zoom. These take place at 7.30pm on the second Wednesday of the month and last about an hour. Although not everyone is comfortable using Zoom, this method has enabled us to meet easily in spite of very cold, dark evenings and has made it possible for some members who can no longer manage to get to services to join in.

Our church magazine was produced in time for Easter, thanks to the hard work of editor Robin Spice and his helpers. It is a super, bumper edition and is also on the KMC and Circuit websites should anyone wish to take a look.

We are very grateful for the support we are receiving from the Circuit while Dave Faulkner is on sabbatical. We hope he is benefitting from a change of routine and is achieving his aims. We also wish him every success with his new book – "Odd One Out".

We would welcome continued prayers for our future as we work to attract enough substantial, long-term lettings to stabilize our finances at KMC.

A pride of lions, a pack of wolves – a benchmark of benches? What are groups of benches called – and what do benches have to do with Merrow you are asking?

The first bench was given to the Church by the Vinall family in memory of Roy Vinall, who was a much loved Merrow member. It has been placed in the garden as Roy loved his gardens and also loved playing football with the children in the Church garden. A second bench was purchased by a Church colleague and has been placed at the front of the Church. 

Weybridge





Trinity, Woking

To stream or not to stream

At Trinity we stream all our morning services (search for Trinity Methodist Church Woking on YouTube). This requires an enlarged technical team – not always easy to resource. Periodically we challenge ourselves whether we should continue. The argument against is that it takes effort and discourages people from coming to church. The argument for is that in terms of the total effort that goes into a service (think musicians, stewards tasks, preacher, readers, sound, refreshments etc.) the effort is relatively low, and that many who watch the stream are unlikely to come to the 'live' service anyway but can watch later. The YouTube stats tend to endorse this. In round numbers perhaps 10 people watch our services live, but after a week there have normally been 50+ hits. That 50+ makes our 'streamers' one of the largest congregations in the circuit! And at a time when 'LA' (local arrangement) increasingly appears on the preaching plan, we should not lose sight of the fact that one church can stream it's service into another. With discussions going on about the future direction of the Circuit, perhaps we need to recognise these possibilities – a very real way that churches can help one another.

Below you will find a wonderful prayer from Enid Burman, one of Trinity's newer members. There is a connection to the above - we first got to know Enid through streamed services and Zoom!
