

## **A Message From Our Superintendent**

Hello everyone,

I have been pondering the past recently for a number of reasons.

You will have heard the sad news that one of our lovely supernumerary ministers, Revd. John Goatley, died recently. In speaking with the family it has become clear (although we didn't know it at the time) that over the past 35-40 years our paths have crossed on a number of different occasions and we have certainly got a number of people that we know in common (it's a small world in Methodism). That has brought to mind some rich pictures and characters from my past 36 years in ministry.

I am a historian by training so the ways in which decisions taken in the past shape and dictate our present (and to some extent our future) have always held fascination for me. That ranges from the effect of carbon emissions on the climate to the effect of where a chapel was built and what kind of building was erected. We are constantly living with the consequences of decisions made in the past.

The wisdom that we need now is tied up with taking those decisions made in the past and applying them to the needs of the present to provide a future full of God's grace and hope. That is not always an easy task.

I rest in the comfort and the knowledge that it is God who holds the future, so that whatever role I play and however I feel that I have failed or succeeded, the words of the hymn are always true:

'Tis Jesus the first and the last, whose spirit shall guide us safe home; we'll praise him for all that is past, and trust him for all that's to come.




### Mission - Evangelism



### **Byfleet**

When this is published our church will have entered a period of major change. We were able to thank David after his last regular service with a church lunch in July and a little later again at a circuit service and tea at our church. Although I am biased, I believe these were successful and enjoyable events and our thanks go to all those involved in them. David's last service was made rather special when we recognised five new members of our church. They came by transfer so we cannot claim the start of a great revival, but it is good to know that people want to join us.



I was asked to write a leaving note about David for The Byfleet Community Newsletter. In doing so I tried to explain to a generally non Methodist readership that he had charge of the Knaphill church and lived in Knaphill, but was then asked to additionally take over a "church that for more than 80 years had had a minister who lived just around the corner and would be regularly seen walking around the village". I was then able to say how well David had cared for us and also guided us through all the Covid openings and closures.

Sydney Samuel we know, and he has already been working with us to show how he will fit us in with the three churches he continues to look after. Hopefully it will be an easier baptism of fire than David's, but Walton, Weybridge, Addlestone and Byfleet will all have to manage with less ministerial time.

Our other big event should have been the 158th Byfleet Parish Day on the Recreation Ground where we would have been one of the 60 plus stalls and outlets, but it had to be cancelled at the last moment because of expected severe weather conditions. I mention it though because we have a "mainly books" stall at very cheap prices and no tombola or the like so people can just browse around and chat. Best of all is when people say "I did not know there was a Methodist church in Byfleet" and we can say "it is just over there" and talk about our activities.

Our premises continue to be used by a variety of users including the wonderful Susan Robinson School of Ballet who once more provided us with a special concert and we provided afternoon tea to follow. Our FoodBank, the Citizens' Advice Woking and Counselling Sessions held by the "With You" charity team also continue on a weekly basis and regularly provide assistance.

### **Cranleigh**

Here at Cranleigh we have had a busy summer. Our main event was our contribution to Cranleigh's Lion's Fair. We held our usual variety of stalls outside the Church which attracted many people throughout the day and this year we also decided to provide Ploughman's lunches. Both of these contributions required a huge effort on the part of Church members and friends and we are so grateful to everyone who helped with these events on the day, as well as before and afterwards with all the preparations and clearing up. The day was a huge success with many people entering our church and sharing time with us as well as raising much needed church funds.

The Baby Bank will restart on Tuesday mornings in September and has been continuing its work throughout the summer by appointment when needed. We are looking at more ways to advertise the Baby Bank in order to reach those who really need its services, so if anyone reading this knows of a need, please do contact us or pass on our details. (cranleighbabybank@gmail.com 07942346486). We can provide anything baby related including nappies, clothes, bedding and equipment, free of charge.

Our outreach at Elmbridge Retirement Village continues through forging closer links with the local Church of England Parish, taking each other's services when needed and presiding over communion as well. We have also encouraged the local Catholic priest and the Quakers to consider leading worship here later in the year. We hold quarterly coffee mornings on a Saturday and the last one in June attracted more than 20 people. The next one is on 2 September. Rev. Allan Taylor continues effectively as our Chaplain, talking with staff and residents when he is in the village on Tuesdays and Fridays and other times by appointment. At our Coronation service of thanksgiving, at Elmbridge, which included our own church congregations, we had almost 70 people attend - a brilliant turn out. We have planned a harvest service and supper on the evening of Tuesday October 10th. The Godalming Band will also support us again this year at the village Remembrance service on the afternoon of 12 November.

Our Church led the way for the Christian Aid week house deliveries in Cranleigh in May, and as a village we raised almost £2000 this year. Other members of the church are involved with other outreach schemes such as the local foodbank and the Hear, Here, hearing aid repair and replacement battery service.

### A tribute to Rev R. Martin Broadbent BD

It was with great sadness that I heard just recently that Martin had passed away, and although I only got to know him when he was my District Chair (in the days of the London South-West District), and then saw little of him when he moved to Bath, my memories of him in the years we worked together are quite clear.

This is not an obituary, but a short collection of thoughts in loving memory of a good servant of the Methodist Church, and a kind friend:

As the Chair of what was then (until September 2006 when the new London District came into being) the largest in the country, Martin seemed utterly unfazed by the magnitude of his responsibilities, and carried his burdens with remarkable equanimity, whether they brought him joy or sadness. He seemed to know everyone, but displayed a particular pastoral care for the ordained ministers and had an especial regard for his superintendents, with whom he met at regular intervals. He greeted us all as if we were long-lost friends and never failed to show a deep interest in the work in which we were currently engaged.

Martin was one of those people with a 'heart as big as all outdoors', and it was very moving when he shared some of his Chair's challenges with his senior colleagues, because we felt both involved and valued. Occasionally his heart would lead him into interesting directions – such as the time he pressed me hard to apply for a District Chair's post, his overtures which I found very difficult to resist!

I also welcomed the occasional informal meetings for the 'ministers of large churches', since I had come south to the Woking & Walton Circuit, and found myself looking after Trinity with a membership of well over 400, plus various chaplaincies, District and Connexional jobs. I needed the help and advice of ministers with similar responsibilities, and I thank Martin for creating the space where the six of us (if memory serves me correctly) could meet and discuss our peculiar challenges.

We all appreciated his sense of humour, and he never minded taking 'a hit', as it were, and laughing at himself. The time when he was teased at the welcome service of one of my colleagues because he was about three feet taller than her stands out in my mind – as also does the time when, faced with some very difficult pastoral decisions, his face was racked with pain and grief. He really did care for us.

Others will write different stories – those are just a few of mine. Our thoughts and prayers are with Teresa and the family, and I would simply conclude by saying, "Martin, God bless you, my friend. Thank you for helping to make the nearly impossible task of being a Superintendent Minister not only bearable, but enjoyable. Requiescat in pace."



## **Godalming United Church**

We marked Christian Aid Week in May with a month-long special collection, dedicated in our Christian Aid Service at the end of May. The service featured Esther from Malawi, with her Pigeon Peas – a story that caught the imagination across the land, with its resonances with the parable of the mustard seed. Esther not only sells her peas but dries them and turns them into flour to make a delicious bread that she sells on. Profits are invested in storage and equipment, education, start-up businesses and community projects. And now, inspired by the Pigeon Pea Recipe Book, we are able to sample Pigeon Pea Bread in Godalming - not quite compatible with jam or marmalade, but a nice alternative to a roll when mopping up stew or soup!

Our annual Church Anniversary service and meal in June was blessed by good weather – an ever-popular combination of BBQ, strawberries & cream, and family entertainments - all set against the backdrop of the Wey Lammas Lands.

GUC is a stakeholder in the Trinity Trust Team – TTT - Godalming's ecumenical Christian youthwork project. In June we were delighted to join in celebrating their twentieth anniversary of working alongside young people in the local community, schools and churches.

The annual collection of clothes and foodstuffs for the Whitechapel Mission for the Homeless was massively supported as ever, with donations coming in from other churches and the wider Godalming community. In June a group of seven from GUC travelled up to visit Whitechapel and came back deeply impressed. The Mission provides not only food, clothing and a hot shower but advice, counselling, and access to computers to help untangle the complications of modern life that are often the root cause of homelessness.

Meanwhile a shipping container has been filled for dispatch to Gambia – packed with furniture and educational & medical supplies, and including a dentists' chair from Southampton!

Across August Adam ran a well-attended Bible study on the book of Revelation – its symbolism and significance for early Christians and its resonances with today's world. A less daunting prospect for us now!

And during the school holidays, we continued to provide packed lunches for children on free school meals in one of Godalming's hidden areas of need – distributed when the community food bank is open.

### A brief history of the GUC Panto (20 years old this season—oh yes, it is!)

It all began in 2003 with an "Edwardian Music Hall" production sparking the idea of involving the GUC Brownies – later the Rainbows too – in a mixed-age production. February, when nothing much else happens, seemed to be a good month. And so the format was born. Our first production was Cinderella in 2004 and at first we used commercially available schools' scripts by Kaye Umansky, But we soon discovered a local lad and script-writer, Josh Dixon, who could produce tailor-made scripts for our mixed bag of performers ranging in age from 4 to "mature", with lots of small speaking parts, dances and songs.

The cast now typically includes about 40 children and 15 adults, 4 backstage crew, a keyboard-player and media operator, costumier and numerous other helpers/supervisors – altogether about 100 people across "Panto weekend".

By now our early performers are young adults! But all have happy memories of this wonderful community event inspired and staged by the Keenes. Malcolm is, sadly, no longer with us, but Barbara keeps the flame burning and is well into preparations for next February's production of Snow White. The Anniversary Party in September is a unique chance for cast, helpers and supporters past and present to meet up before schools and colleges return.

### **Guildford St Mary's**

As we approach autumn, we look forward to a range of events and activities at St Mary's. In September we always draw on the history of the building to participate in the annual Heritage Weekend (marked this year in Guildford on 9-10 September). Whilst the history draws people in, our aim is to demonstrate that the Church is a living community relevant to today.

This year Heritage Weekend coincides with an exhibition we are hosting 'Proud to be Surrey - Students of Faith' - a major photo exhibition exploring the wide range of faith stories and perspectives that are represented within the student body of the University of Surrey. The University has one of the most diverse and cohesive Chaplaincy Teams in the country and is used as a model of best practice by groups around the world. This exhibition celebrates the multi-faith nature of the student life of the University and the stories that come from that richness of experience. The exhibition will be at St. Mary's from 24 August through to the second week in October.

As we approach Harvest, it's a joy to share the pleasure of some young refugees from various countries as they harvest their crops in our churchyard. Some local gardeners responded to a desire from these young men accommodated in Guildford Town Centre to get involved in growing and we've been pleased to let them use part of the churchyard for this.

Sadly, there seems no prospect for an early end to the conflict in Ukraine which means our weekly *Vigil for Peace* will be continuing on Friday evenings. By July, over 5,000 people had attended since February 2022, with numbers each week ranging from 50 to over 100. It is a great privilege to have them all demonstrate their concern for those involved in the conflict. Most attending have not planned to include visiting a church during their Friday night out. They all leave expressing gratitude.

We have had many moving moments, especially with Ukrainian visitors, and some lighter ones. One evening some youngsters came in at around 10:45pm, one of whom left with the comment 'This is a cool project'. When this was reported in the following Sunday morning's service, a worshipper who was being welcomed into membership was pleased to say she was joining a cool church!

We were sad to say goodbye in May to the Parish Rector, Robert Cotton, who first invited us to come to St Mary's and was instrumental in supporting the changes to the building and encouraging the development of our mission. We are in an interregnum at the moment but we're grateful for the opportunity to participate in the appointment process for the new Rector – quite a contrast to the Methodist system. The outcome is the appointment of Rev Canon Simon Butler who will become Rector in January. Simon has been Rector of St Mary's, Battersea for some 12 years and we look forward to welcoming him to share our continuing journey.

Before then, our journey this year will again include lunchtime Advent Reflections on Thursdays 30 November to 14 December. More details will be posted on the Circuit website nearer the time but please note the dates – we'd love to see you.



### **Knaphill**

We have held our usual events over the past few months - Clothes4U every 3<sup>rd</sup> Saturday in the month (1.30-4pm) and Coffee Mornings on the 4<sup>th</sup> Saturday (10am-12 noon). C4U is a most valuable outreach which has enabled many families to obtain good quality clothing without spending much needed cash. There were more people at the July C4U than ever before, which may reflect the financial difficulties many families are experiencing.

Fortunately, however, our Coffee Mornings continue to do well, usually raising over £300 each time. The one on 27<sup>th</sup> May, which included a plant sale, was amazingly successful, raising a wonderful £702.50 for church funds. In addition to these regular events, Tarina Berry is organising a second Coffee Morning in aid of Kent, Surrey and Sussex Air Ambulance Trust, on Saturday 9<sup>th</sup> September (see below and flyer on page 14 for details).

We worked hard collecting during Christian Aid Week in May. With help from members of other churches in the area we managed to cover a few more roads than has recently been possible. That, together with some exceedingly generous donations, meant we raised the best total since 2010 - a magnificent £2951.23!

We would like to thank Claire Hargreaves for all the support we received at KMC while Dave Faulkner was on Sabbatical. We had our final service with Dave at Knaphill on 9<sup>th</sup> July, followed by the Circuit Farewell Service at Byfleet on 16<sup>th</sup>. Both were lovely services, followed by great food and fellowship. We thank Dave for all his hard work at Knaphill and wish him, Debbie, Becky and Mark all the very best.

We welcome Paul Glass as our Minister in Pastoral Charge and look forward to our Covenant Service, led by him, on 3<sup>rd</sup> September and Harvest on 24<sup>th</sup>. We are also pleased to be hosting the Circuit Service at 6pm on Sunday 10<sup>th</sup> September to formally welcome Paul to Knaphill and Sidney Samuel to Byfleet. In October, KMC will be hosting the Circuit Mission Day between 10am and 1pm on Saturday 7<sup>th</sup>.

On a less positive note, we are still struggling to attract enough substantial, long-term lettings to stabilize our finances at KMC, so would welcome continued prayers for our future.


### Merrow

It has been 'all go' at Merrow. There seemed to be a lot going on (coronation parties, church anniversaries, summer teas) – and all of them involved lots of cake!

## **Trinity, Woking**

### Foundry Worship & Waymaker Groups

Students of the Wey Valley preaching plan will see LA/FW appear every other Sunday evening against Trinity. FW for Foundry Worship. So, what is it?

Foundry Worship is a different stye of worship. We seat Café style with refreshments available. We have a band that leads a time of praise - varied but predominantly contemporary songs. A leader each week introduces the theme and delivers a short message. We take opportunity to share thoughts and stories relating to the theme – it is amazing the power these have on each other.

What is now Foundry Worship (FW) started 6 years ago. A small group of Trinity people met every other Sunday evening for a time of informal, contemporary worship. We would share together our joys and our concerns and pray for one another. We were rarely more than a dozen people. It was all very simple, trusting the Spirit to lead us.

We often discussed and prayed about how FW should evolve. This was necessary, but it diverted our energy. Commitment to and attendance at FW struggled - for a while we even questioned whether FW was sustainable. Yet there remained a real sense of God being in what we were doing, so we stuck to our fortnightly worship pattern. We persevered in prayer and in time more people started to attend, including some musicians. Hope grew.

Then Covid struck. This could have ended FW for good, but a quick switch to Zoom enabled us to continue our fortnightly services. These were very different but helped preserve our identity. As a result, when we were allowed to start meeting in person again, FW resumed. More people started to attend, and more musicians joined until today we are a diverse group with about 30 people attending each service – and growing. Attendance is split roughly 50:50 between Trinity members and those from other churches, or none.

We always wanted to start smaller group meetings on the back of FW. In early 2022 we had a series of FW's based on the Methodist Way of Life. This led to our first Waymaker group – a name 'borrowed' from the title of one of the worship songs we sing. The group meets fortnightly. We usually pick an aspect of the theme from the previous FW, exploring it from a different perspective. The first group is now getting quite large, so we are hoping to start a second group soon.

So, what is our theological emphasis? Our vision is to create a place where diversity in all its forms is welcomed. We see Jesus as the model of righteous living, and we are careful not to overlay our prejudices onto that. Empowered by the Holy Spirit within us, we seek to be the means by which God's love is experienced around us. And we remember that God is the arbiter of who is saved, not us. To me this theological emphasis seems very Methodist.

What of the future? We hope FW will continue to grow. This is already creating challenges – the human dynamic between a dozen people is different from that between 30. Our prayer is that we will continue to evolve a pattern of worship where all who worship with us feel free to be themselves and express as such. And of course, a few extra Waymaker groups wouldn't go amiss either.

Finally, an open invitation. If anyone wants to join us for Foundry Worship, you would be most welcome. If you email me (hugh.bowerman@gmail.com) I will add you to our Foundry Worship mailing list which sends a reminder of when we meet and what our theme will be.
