




The Wey Valley Methodist Circuit

The FoodBank and the associated services also continue to provide wonderful support for our local community.





At the time of writing this, we are both reflecting on the past and looking forward to the future. We reflect on and give thanks for two amazing Harvest Festival services led by our own minister Paul. Our morning service was attended by over 30 people and our village ecumenical evening service filled our church and was attended by members of all four churches in Cranleigh. Cranleigh FoodBank received all the goodies generously given by members of our congregation.

We have held a toy sale to raise funds for Church and to provide people with choices for early Christmas shopping. We are very grateful as always to those who organised and ran this and to those who came to buy.

In August our church was packed for the thanksgiving service for the life of Beryl Stedman who sadly passed away earlier in the year. She is fondly remembered by all as a lifelong and loyal member of our church, a friend and as a Sunday School teacher for many years.

We are looking forward to the season of Advent and wish you all a very happy and peaceful Christmas and New Year.

Our church life at Elmbridge continues to blossom, our regular weekly congregations for the fast-becoming ecumenical services, average 30 to 40 each week. Our harvest service saw 45 attending the service and 35 to the supper afterwards. Four very large carrier bags with both tins, boxes and other packaged food together with fresh fruit and vegetables, were donated to Cranleigh FoodBank and very gratefully received. They now support about 26 families each week.



By the time this publication is read, our Remembrance service will have taken place on 12 November. We will be supported by the Godalming Band, as we were last year, welcoming the retired Bishop Peter Hancock to preach at the service supported by other clergy both from the Methodist circuit and the local Church of England, St Nicolas. We expect around 70 to the service with tea and cake afterwards. A local deputy lieutenant of Surrey, Mary Cresswell, will read a lesson and other readers will be drawn from our own residents.

Forthcoming services include a Quaker experience, Catholic Father Alistair leading worship, and plans are underway for the carol service on Saturday 16 December at 2.30pm when our own Paul Glass, together with Rector of St. Nicolas, Roy Woodhams will lead worship followed by mulled wine and mince pies. We hope to welcome up to 70 to this service.

Rev John Goatley 1929-2023

It is with sadness that we report the death of John Goatley, a much-loved member of our ministry team since he and his wife Margaret moved to Milford in 2013. John was very much a West-Countryman, being born in Saltash and spending much of his adult life in Budleigh Salterton. In the 50s he trained initially as an engineer in the Sheffield steel industry and Glasgow University, simultaneously taking up local preaching (and meeting Margaret), then entering the Methodist ministry in 1958. The growing family spent 10 years in Sierra Leone - a good friend travelled from Freetown to be at the funeral - and John retained a keen interest in the work of the worldwide church and Christian Aid. On moving back home he was stationed in circuits successively around the country – Exmouth & Budleigh Saltertor; Aldershot, Farnborough & Camberley; Diss; South Wirral and then 19 years of retirement back in Devon. John possessed compassion, a keen sense of humour and a sharp intellect wrapped up in rock-solid faith. He was a wise and thoughtful preacher. His was a long and well-lived life, and a blessing to many people.

Looking Back

Our charitable link with The Gambia continues to be as much needed as ever. In the summer a 40ft shipping container was loaded at Guildford Safestore with upcycled treasures for educational and medical use – including an entire suite of office furniture (already earmarked for use in the Education department!), a dental chair from Southampton, 315 pairs of children's shoes from a Kent-based charity, 60 bags of children's clothing, and 105 boxes of books and stationery with September's Cream Tea raising over £400 for the ongoing Opthalmic Appeal (funding cataracts at £15 a procedure).

In August the Rowling family accompanied the National Methodist Youth Brass Band on their 10 day annual tour – this time to Wales. Starting at Mumbles, near Swansea, they played in Clyne Gardens and local churches, then moved north to Aberystwyth (hosted by local church members - beds to sleep on – not church floors!) – with a special appearance at Abergynolwyn Station on the famous Talyllyn railway. Continuing north they played in the beautiful Italianate surroundings of Port Meirion and on to the highlight of the tour – performing in the heart of Caernarfon Castle at the spot where in 1969 the then Prince Charles was invested as Prince of Wales. The tour concluded at Penmaenmawr and a concert on the pier at Bangor. Daily reflections – delving into faith and meeting God together - are integral to the tours, this year's theme being "God is ..." The band led worship in their host churches on both of Sundays. In September local member Tom Hart was inaugurated as Youth President of the Methodist Church of Britain.

September's Pantomime 20th Anniversary Celebration was attended by over 80 performers, helpers and supporters past and present. It was a great opportunity to reminisce and relive golden moments with videos & photos and light refreshments – plus a chance to dress up in the array of wigs, hats and costumes and props available! And of course, a huge tribute to Barbara and Malcolm Keene who have

steered this project from small beginnings to the important community and church outreach event that it is today. Preparations for next February's panto are already under way.

On Sunday October 15th we celebrated Harvest with gifts of non-perishable foodstuffs for the St Mark's FoodBank, followed by a delicious Bring-and-Share Lunch. The older children at St Hilary's School generously donated a mountain of school stationery for our charitable link with Kola Kundi School in The Gambia as part of their Harvest Assembly. We're very grateful for this continuing link – recent photos show children there wearing hand-me-down items of St Hilary's school uniform!



NEW WAYS OF THINKING

This autumn we marked 10 years since Guildford Methodist Church moved to St Mary's and stepped into a new phase of its life. The journey has been, and continues to be, an adventure with challenges, surprises and opportunities along the way.

The key driver in the move was a desire to be back in the heart of Guildford's Town Centre where the people are – we had to give up comfortable modern premises which were then out of proportion to the size of the congregation and move to an ancient building with (to put it mildly) limited facilities for the 21st century. What we hadn't realised was that the drawing power of the ancient building would itself 'open the door' to encounters with thousands of people from all over the world.

Encountering people was undoubtedly an objective but quite a scary one and, as I came to write this, an online devotional happened to point me to Jeremiah's resistance to God's call to prophecy (chapter 1) on grounds of youth and not knowing how to speak. We couldn't plead youthfulness (!) but weren't sure how to speak to those we encountered. God's reassurance to Jeremiah not to be afraid of those to whom he was to speak '*Do not be afraid of them, for I am with you to deliver you, declares the Lord*' has rung true for us - but we do have to keep reminding ourselves of it.

We have to overcome shyness and nervousness to engage with people of all backgrounds, be non-judgmental, and learn from them:

- The foreign residents coming to terms with life in England who visit ChitChat and have such a variety of needs beyond just coping with the language.
- The visitors from around the world stunned to learn that one church building can be a place of worship for Methodists, Anglicans, Orthodox and Roman Catholic worshippers.
- Young people gobsmacked to find themselves in a church during a Friday night out between pub and club visits.
- A 'confirmed atheist' who declared it was a miracle that he'd been persuaded to come into a church building to light a candle of concern.
- A young man who'd clearly indulged generously at local hostelries and wanted accompanying to place his Vigil candle on the steps in the church with those of other visitors, expressed his amazement at the setting in his vernacular and engaged in conversation about prayer and communication for some time, but obviously satisfied as he left with a friendly fist bump!
- An Ethiopian Christian couple who were amazed and heartened that our recent Students of Faith exhibition included pictures and testimonies from Muslim and other non-Christian students and

contrasted the prominence of our church building with their historic ones carved into the rock for protection and concealment.

• The drama students Paul has encouraged to feel at home filming in the building.

I have a feeling that some of the lovely, caring, faithful Methodists who nurtured my earlier years might have struggled with some of this and we have had to adapt our thinking to recognise that our encounters are primarily to give a glimpse of God and his love, and less of a recruitment drive to find worshippers for 10.30 on a Sunday morning.

So we were in a mood to celebrate 10 years together, the privilege of our situation and richness of our ecumenical partnerships and commit to develop GMC/St Mary's ministry going forward.

And looking forward, we extend a warm invitation to you all to:

- Call in for a chat and coffee or tea during our daytime opening usually Tuesday 1-3pm and Thursday 11am to 3pm- but check before travelling!
- Drop in during our Friday night Vigils for Peace 9-11 pm.
- Come along at 12.30 to our lunchtime Advent Reflections Thursdays from 30 November to 14 December and Carols at Lunchtime on Thursday 21 December.

Knaphill

We have had a very busy time in Knaphill over the past two months, with more activities to come. We had a lovely Harvest Festival service on 24th September, with donations of food, clothing and money being made to the Whitechapel Mission. We were able to send £175 directly to the Mission and hope to take the goods there on 19th November, when three members of KMC are planning to attend their Anniversary Service. There was also a well-attended Harvest Service at The Vyne Community Centre in Knaphill on 13th October, organised by Churches Together (C4K) with donations going to Woking FoodBank. The congregation were all of an older generation and clearly enjoyed singing the traditional harvest hymns.

At KMC itself, Coffee Mornings have continued successfully, with the extra one on 9th September raising the fantastic sum of £1002.15 in aid of the Air Ambulance Trust, KSSAAT. Tarina Berry, who organised it, was delighted with this amount which was significantly more than last year's figure of £855. She has already fixed a date for next year's event – Saturday 7th September 2024. Meanwhile, we are gearing up for our own KMC Christmas Coffee Morning on 25th November, with all our usual stalls having a "flavour" of Christmas!

The Clothing Bank, Clothes4U, continues to be very well used, with many families able to obtain the items they are seeking from the large amounts of clothing currently available. Donated refreshments are served throughout the afternoon and the ladies in the kitchen are always kept very busy!

The Circuit Service on 10th October to recognise Rev Dr Paul Glass and Rev Sydney Samuel Lake as Ministers in Charge of Knaphill and Byfleet respectively, was a joyous occasion. We were very pleased to welcome members from all parts of the circuit to KMC.

Next month we have a Remembrance Service at the War Memorial in Knaphill on Armistice Day. This is arranged by C4K, with participation from clergy and members from all four churches, two local schools, our Woking MP, Mr Jonathan Lord and local Councillors, plus army representatives from Pirbright Barracks. It is only a short service, but it is most moving and has even been known to bring the traffic to a standstill – literally.

On 3rd December our morning service will include donations of gifts for the Salvation Army to distribute to needy families at Christmas, with representatives from the Woking SA Corps attending to receive them. This is followed on Sunday 10th by the Christmas Afternoon Tea with Carols for folk in the area who are elderly or live alone. This has become a standard, very popular fixture, so we expect it to be well attended and most enjoyable.

By the time we reach the end of our Carols by Candlelight Service (starts at 6pm on Sunday 17th December), we will all be ready for a rest!

Where are we at with the Building?

We reported in the last issue of Wey Forward that, following the loss of their financial support, the Borough Council had encouraged us to pursue a funding application with SCC's "Your Fund Surrey".

Update on this below from Simon Perkins: -

Our project is continuing to gain "likes" on the Commonplace website – the first stage in applying to Your Fund Surrey. We have met again with a Your Fund Surrey representative from Surrey County Council, and we have taken the next step - Idea Submission. This comprises a description of the project and its likely impact, information about the level of local support and a first financial estimate - £1.3m for the whole project.

We are likely to hear whether we may proceed to Full Submission a month or so after making the Idea Submission.

Update on Sheerwater Regeneration:

The Borough Council held a public consultation giving residents the opportunity to have their say over what should happen with the remainder of the regeneration site. Two phases of the consented scheme have been completed and a further three are underway, this will require additional borrowing by the Council to ensure their completion. The proposal is to refurbish roughly 100 properties and look to sell areas for redevelopment. All information can be found on the Woking Borough Council website.

The start of the term saw the Pop-up Café and Tots Praise resume. It was lovely to welcome back the families and to meet new ones.

We are always grateful to everyone who supports us in prayer, time, and financial ways as we continue our work within the local community and working with our partners.



South African Archbishop Desmond Tutu (1931–2021) envisions God's dream for the world through a message of hope, justice, peace, and inclusion:

Dear Child of God, before we can become God's partners, we must know what God wants for us. "I have a dream," God says. "Please help Me to realize it. It is a dream of a world whose ugliness and squalor and poverty, its war and hostility, its greed and harsh competitiveness, its alienation and disharmony are changed into their glorious counterparts, when there will be more laughter, joy, and peace, where there will be justice and goodness and compassion and love and caring and sharing. I have a dream that swords will be beaten into plowshares and spears into pruning hooks, that My children will know that they are members of one family, the human family, God's family, My family."

In God's family, there are no outsiders. All are insiders. Black and white, rich and poor, gay and straight, Jew and Arab, Palestinian and Israeli, Roman Catholic and Protestant, Serb and Albanian, Hutu and Tutsi, Muslim and Christian, Buddhist and Hindu, Pakistani and Indian—all belong.... We have heard of God's dream from His prophets throughout history and in modern times from great leaders and humanitarians like Martin Luther King, Jr. and Mahatma Gandhi. King spoke of it ... when he dreamed of the day that the sons of former slaves and the sons of former slave owners in Georgia would be able "to sit down together at the table of brotherhood." [1] Gandhi wrote about it in 1929 when he stated that his goal was not just the brotherhood of Indian humanity but "the mission of brotherhood of man." [2] (Today they would have referred to daughters and sisterhood, too.) The visions and triumphs of these prophets of God helped change their nations and inspire the rest of us around the world in our own struggles for equality.

Tutu finds God's dream for an inclusive community embodied in Jesus:

We can look at the life of Jesus to see what God asks of us. Jesus came into a deeply divided and polarized society. There was the divide between the hated foreign oppressor and the citizens of the vassal state. Within Judaism there were different religious groupings, the Pharisees, the Sadducees, the Zealots. There was the divide between the Jew, the Gentile, and the Samaritan. And then men were segregated from women. There were free persons and there were slaves. There were the rich; there were the poor. The world saw a veritable miracle unfolding before its very eyes as all sorts and conditions of women and men, rich and poor, slave and free, Jew and Gentile—all these came to belong in one fellowship, one communion. They did not regard one another just as equals. That, in itself, would have been a huge miracle.... No, they regarded one another not just as equals but as sisters and brothers, members of one family, God's family.

Walton-on-Thames

The start of the Methodist Year in September has been busy at Walton, with a well-supported fund raiser for the Macmillan coffee morning drawing in support from our local community, including a visiting American couple who came back for our Sunday service.

A significant achievement for us was to resurrect our Pudding and Praise café worship as well, which we held in our freshly decorated hall with a focus on modern worship led by Breeze. We have a simple focus on praise, prayer, meditation and worship in these services. We hope to build on the use of this informal, alternative worship to draw people into our church.

In early October, we held our Harvest Festival Parade service which was well supported by our uniformed groups. We set them the challenge of educating us about two of our local community charity outreach programmes. The first was The Elmbridge Eco Hub (<u>www.elmbridgeecohub.org.uk</u>) which is based in the centre of Walton-on-Thames. Everything they do is rooted in three things:

1) <u>Community</u>: emphasising benefitting people in our community, ensuring every member has access to food, skills and equipment, either free or at very low cost.

2) <u>Opportunity</u>: emphasising the provision of opportunities for people to learn and share their knowledge with others, striving to encourage and facilitate people to reach their potential, improve confidence and their understanding of the world we live in.

3) <u>Environment</u>: holding a strong belief in the circular economy and trying to improve our environment in many ways with aims to recycle, upcycle, reuse what we can, reduce waste and teach others to do the same.

Through this fantastic "practical tripod", the Eco Hub provides our local community with access to a multi-functional, safe space where they can reduce waste and access many beneficial initiatives such as the Library of Things, Community Fridge, Refill Shop, Skill Share, Repair Cafe, Small item recycling, Community Garden, Seed Bank, Jigsaw swap, Book Swap to name but a few – all under ONE roof!

The second charity is Smiles 2 Smiles (<u>www.smiles2smiles.co.uk</u>) which was started by a group of local mums 12 years ago, and whose aim is to support those across our community who are in need of a little extra support, with a big focus around Christmas. The aim is to relieve those suffering from poverty or financial hardship in the UK by providing items and services to individuals in need that they could not otherwise afford.

We were very pleased to support both charities through our Harvest Festival and we will support Smiles 2 Smiles running up to Advent with their Christmas present appeal.

Over the same weekend as our Harvest, five members from our youth group joined in with another 11 young people from the Sunbury and Teddington Circuit and headed on up (with five leaders) to the Birmingham NEC for the annual MC youth festival event which is known as 3 Generate. This was an unbelievably lively and busy event, going from early in the morning to late at night with the young people having access to over 180 different sessions and activities exploring every nook and cranny of what it

means to be a young Christian in 2023. On 14th January our Youth Group are planning their own Pudding and Praise, which will be an expression of and reflection on the issues and the styles of worship that they are interested in.

Our Carol Service is scheduled for 17th December, and we hope to have contributions from two singing groups which use our premises each week. This will be a good way to build bridges with these groups and the local community. On Christmas Eve, we have a Local Arrangement which we will use as an opportunity to have a Songs of Praise service themed around more carol singing and, in January 2024 we are hosting a virtual training session for Mental Health First Aid. This is an excellent opportunity to receive new insights into how to help people with mental health issues. There are subsidised (hugely!) places available on this course so please contact Ross Richardson <u>r.richardson952@btinternet.com</u> for further information or to book a place.

We ask for your prayers for both Rev Sydney Samuel, his family and Walton Methodist Church, as we all go through the stationing process over the next month.

As more and more BNO families immigrated from Hong Kong to UK in recent years, many Christian families who came to Surrey also brought their young children to attend our church. The number of young children (from nursery to year 6) is 40 while the teenagers are 25. Together with the team of devoted teachers and parent helpers, the total number reaches 85 in Sunday School.
