Circuit Letter 11.06.25 Revd. Peter Hills

Dear Friends,

When you drive east into Sevenoaks along the A25, if you ever do, you pass a chapel on the right. It looks like any other church, but is a Unitarian chapel. Unitarians are part of the Christian family, in a sense, but would not be able to join, say, Churches Together in England. It's a long story, but, although they are followers of Jesus, and some use a liturgy not dissimilar to the Book of Common Prayer (though worship tends to take a much freer form these days) and may even hold a Communion service, one thing above all others separates them from almost all other Christian churches. They do not believe that Jesus was divine; and they do not believe in the Holy Trinity.

They share the same Biblical roots as us, but approach the Bible in a more rational way, they would say. Their faith is in Jesus the man, the teacher, rather than the healer and miracleworker. Their institutional roots lie in the 16th century, and a group called the Socinians, among others; it was an Anglican priest who is believed to have introduced the Unitarians to England, but by and large most Unitarian churches in this country were founded by Presbyterians. Interestingly, the Sevenoaks chapel was originally Baptist.

I am busy preparing a service for the coming Sunday, known as Trinity Sunday; and will once again be preaching on the Holy Trinity. I wish it were easy, but it isn't. A few weeks ago, I had the great privilege and pleasure to baptise an infant, which I did in the name of the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit. Not three Gods, but one God 'in three persons'. The blessings I pronounce are trinitarian, and we often share 'the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, the love of God, and the fellowship of the Holy Spirit.'

I have every sympathy with the Unitarians. Indeed, I have encountered many a Methodist 'unitarian' over the years. The reason the first Unitarians followed a different path was that they could not find the doctrine of the Holy Trinity in the Bible. Yet I remain a trinitarian: I just wish I didn't have to try to explain the Trinity on the Sunday after Pentecost. But I listen to Jesus telling his disciples that he and the Father are one. I hear the poem beginning the Bible describe the wind from God – also translatable as Spirit – sweep across the face of the waters; and later, God saying, 'let US make humankind in OUR own image.' I hear another poem, from the hand of the apostle John: 'In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God.'

I try to follow Jesus, though could always do better. I am a fan of the Jesus Prayer: 'Lord Jesus Christ, have mercy on me, a sinner.' I say the 'Our Father' every day, though not always thinking about the words. (I occasionally say it in German, for that reason.) I say an ancient prayer on Monday mornings, which begins, 'O Holy Spirit, as the sun is full of light, the ocean full of water, heaven full of glory, so may my heart be full of thee.' I somehow find that the most challenging ('Come as power, to expel every rebel lust, to reign supreme and keep me thine.'). Whichever words I use, I am addressing God, the One God. It really doesn't matter a hoot what I believe about the nature of God, in an intellectual sense. What matters is knowing that I am loved; that we all are loved, and that we are called to love; that there is no greater demonstration of God's love than through the birth, life death and resurrection of Jesus; and that his Spirit is the source of my knowledge, my understanding, whatever holiness I may have, my beauty, and my joy.
