'Money, money, money'



I'm writing this whilst on a short break on the Suffolk coast. Nowadays, changed circumstances mean that I spend most of these occasions alone – though being solitary for a short time is quite different from being lonely. I've spent a few hours today listening to the sea, re-reading Chapter 16 in Luke's Gospel with the help of Joseph Fitzmyer's wonderful commentary, and musing on a number of recent events all of which seem to have the subject of money in common.

The events, not in any chronological sequence or order of importance, are:

- The purchase of twelve F-35A fighter bombers, specifically to add to Britain's existing nuclear deterrent, at approximately £70 million per aeroplane;
- The recent vote in the House of Commons on the Welfare Bill which, even amended by Labour 'rebels', will cut benefits to many of the poorest and most disabled by nearly twice the total cost of the new aircraft (above);
- The wedding in Venice of Lauren Sanchez to Jeff Bezos, who is reported to be worth more than £150 *billion* (!), which cost about £41 million. Who knows what the eventual bill will be for jewellery, the honeymoon and sundries?
- The imminent eviction of the entire population of the small Dorset village of Littlebredy, because it lies entirely within an estate that has been sold by its corporate owners for about £30 million. The report of this sad tale summed it up with the comment, 'This is the power of money'.

The problem with money is that it can become a God-send or a curse. When my father died almost penniless over fifty years ago, I developed a phobia of poverty in old-age, and became obsessed with living within our means and saving for retirement. Thankfully, this has enabled Joan and I to find the eye-watering payments for her nursing care in Guildford House. Money, in this way, has ensured that she has the care that she deserves, and helps mitigate the awful effects of her Parkinson's Disease.

But money is a two-edged sword. It can corrupt even the most honest of us. Any government has to balance how it both raises and spends money, so that the needs of the people it governs can be met – for security, health and well-being. It's an unenviable task! On a personal level, I remember during one of our ministerial staff meetings in the 1990s, in what was then the Woking & Walton Circuit, my 'associate minister' at Trinity talked quite frankly about the subtle, insidious effects of money. Her father had been an agricultural labourer and she had had quite a deprived childhood, financially. At the time she was speaking, she was more than comfortably off, but worried that her comparative wealth had anaesthetised her and altered her perception of value. She was genuinely

afraid of becoming like those people (and we've all met them) who 'know the price of everything and the value of nothing'.

There's no simple answer to this, of course. Jesus' teaching in Chapter 16 of Luke's Gospel and elsewhere stresses the importance of keeping a balanced perspective. It is the *love* money which is the 'root of all evil'; it is when we let our possessions possess *us*, that our values become warped.

In one of Gene Roddenberry's *Star Trek* stories, Captain Jean Luc Picard explains to a woman from the 21st century that in his era (the 23rd century), people don't work for money, because the need for the acquisition of personal wealth has disappeared. Oh, were that to be true, one day!

Maybe so, but for the moment, each of us as Christians have to be 'good stewards of God's varied grace', to quote St. Paul. Whether we have one talent or ten, we have a responsibility to use <u>all</u> our resources – including money – wisely, because everything we have, even the air that we breathe, belongs to God and is ultimately a gift from Him.



A Prayer: Loving God, give us a true perspective on our possessions, so that we may never lose our sense of what is truly valuable. Help us to be good stewards of all your gifts, taking delight in the benefits that money can bring, but being ever mindful of the needs of others, particularly those less fortunate than ourselves. Through Jesus Christ our Lord.


