The context for this quote was in regard to a popular computer company and its future, but it got me wondering about how we look at optimism and enthusiasm in the context of our churches and their futures.

I'm on record for my belief that optimism is something that is lacking in modern denominations, at least here in the U.K. My own denomination, the United Reformed Church, seems to spend its denominational meetings talking about what to do with the leftover money when they eventually close. The Methodist Church as a whole, doesn't seem to be as gloomy, but I've definitely encountered that attitude in local churches.

Going back to the quote that started all of this, the author's implication is that enthusiasm is bad and optimism is good, because a decision is based in logic and a feeling is based on something intangible. That feelings are hopeless expressions of what we want and desire, rather than having a basis in reality. However, I have to ask, is that a bad thing? After all, God made humanity as both thinking <u>and</u> feeling beings. The trick seems to be balancing the two out.

I believe that we can be both optimistic and enthusiastic about the future of our churches. We believe that God is at work. We see the fruits of that work in ways large and small. Even when the world throws obstacles in our way.

"For I know the plans I have for you," declares the LORD, "plans to prosper you and not to harm you, plans to give you hope and a future." – (Jeremiah 29:11)


