### Dear friends,

For 38 years of my 40 years in ministry I have been in Chaplaincy. Two theatres, two schools, one university, one industrial plastics molding company and one 24 hour opening supermarket ('ASDA colleague...happy to help.').

Last week was a busy one with a graduation ceremony to attend (celebrating the retirement of Revd. Duncan Myers as Anglican Chaplain to Surrey University - and his 100 degree ceremonies in 5 years!). You can see from the photo the lovely and very special group of people that I work with - Hindu, Muslim, Ba'Hai, Buddhist, Humanist, Jewish and Christian colleagues.



That was on Friday, but then on Thursday I presented three puppet shows at Woodlands School in Leatherhead. A school for over 100 very special children indeed - many in wheelchairs and often non-verbal. To see the love the staff showed to these amazing young people was inspiring.

Two days before that on Tuesday evening I attended a talk by Bishop Graham Tomlin and something that he said pulled my week together in a quite remarkable way. 'We are not adverts for God,' he said...'we are letters from God.' And if we are going to be authentic, truthful letters that really hit home with people and have an effect on them then those letters need to include our frailty, our brokenness and something of the messiness of the lives that we lead.

Wherever I go, I can only be myself. I am far from perfect. I am not in any remote way an advert for God. I am far too flawed for that. But I can be a letter. Whether it is engaging with

students and their families as part of a multi faith Chaplaincy Team, or doing a puppet show and meeting staff at a very special school, or taking a fellowship group at a Church - all I can do is to remind myself that at all times I am a letter from God in the world.

As Paul says: 2 Cor. 3. 3 You show that you are a letter from Christ, the result of our ministry, written not with ink but with the Spirit of the living God, not on tablets of stone but on tablets of human hearts.



ur tour begins with a visit to Sainte-Chapelle, a palatine chapel on the Île de la Cité. Built for King (later Saint) Louis IX to house the Holy Crown of Thorns, a piece of the True Cross and various relics of the Passion that he had acquired from 1239 onwards, this former royal chapel boasts one of the finest collections of stained glass in Europe and is known as The Jewel Box of Paris.

Our second church is a 10 minute walk away—the medieval Notre-Dame de Paris. Recently restored following the tragic fire on 15 April 2019, the cathedral is a particularly fine example of French Gothic architecture, especially its pioneering use of rib vaults, flying buttresses and huge rose windows.

After lunch we have a 15 minute walk to the Church of Saint-Louis-en-l'Île, a Baroque church hidden behind a plain and innocent-looking façade. It was built 1664-1725 and although much of its original interior was lost in the French Revolution, it was extensively restored in the nineteenth century.

From here we have a 20 minute walk to Saint Etienne du Mont, a sixteenth century

church that contains the shrine of St. Geneviève, the patron saint of Paris. Famous for its rood screen and double spiral staircase leading to a gallery, the church was renovated by the City Architect Victor Baltard in 1865-68. He restored the façade and replaced some of the sculpture and stained glass that had been destroyed in the Revolution.

In the evening we will dine together at a bistro by the Eiffel Tower and take a one-hour guided cruise along the River Seine. Once back ashore we can enjoy an evening stroll around the Eiffel tower before returning to our hotels.

On Sunday, you can either spend the morning doing your own thing in Paris or join us for a visit to Sacré Cœur in Montmartre.

The tour involves a walk of about 30 minutes duration (2½ km). If you have difficulties walking any distance, please let us know so we can provide you with a Navigo Travel Card and map with bus and metro details.
