#### A Call to Uphold Confidentiality and Embrace Community

Dear Beloved Members of the Wey Valley Circuit,

As we embark on the journey into the Methodist Year 2025–2026, our hearts are filled with hope, gratitude, and a renewed sense of purpose. Revelation 21:5 reassures us:

"Behold, I am making all things new."

This new chapter is not merely a change in date but a sacred opportunity for renewal—an invitation to deepen our commitment to living out the Gospel with integrity, compassion, and trust. As a circuit comprising 13 vibrant churches, our strength lies in our unity, our shared faith, and our mutual care.

Today, I wish to highlight a vital aspect of our life together: **confidentiality**.

Conversely, honouring confidence fosters a safe space where healing and growth can flourish. As Scripture teaches us, Christ's love never shames or exposes but embraces with dignity. Even with good intentions, careless words can cause lasting harm. Upholding confidentiality is a sacred duty—an act of love that preserves dignity and trust.

I also want to emphasise that confidentiality is not only a matter of professional ethics or work practice; it's a calling for everyone. It's not confined to pastors, counsellors, or professionals—it's for families, friends, neighbours, and anyone who walks the streets. We are all called to watch, listen, see, and react at the appropriate time, with wisdom and love. When we choose to honour what is shared in confidence, we demonstrate Christ's love in action.

In our Wey Valley Circuit, I invite us all to renew this commitment. Let us:

- Respect what is shared in confidence.
- Pray privately and faithfully, avoiding turning prayer into gossip or speculation.
- Be mindful of our words, recognising their power to build up or tear down.

As James reminds us:

"The tongue is a small part of the body, but it makes great boasts. Consider what a great forest is set on fire by a small spark." (James 3:5)

As we begin this new year, I encourage each of us to reflect:

- How can I better uphold confidentiality in my daily interactions?
- How can I create a safe, trustworthy environment within my church and community?

• In what ways can my speech more closely mirror the grace and love of Christ?

We also rejoice in the milestones and blessings among us:

- In August, Merrow Methodist Church celebrated 100 years of faithful service by Mr Frank Winder, a testament to enduring dedication. Happy Birthday, Frank.
- Our lively tea and coffee programmes at Stoughton and West Horsley continue to be warm spaces of welcome and fellowship.



Rachel Lampard, Director of Social Justice & Social Action for The Methodist Church

Rachel Lampard has worked for many years to help churches to engage with issues of social justice, particularly through the Methodist Church and the ecumenical Joint Public Issues Team. She is currently the Director for Social Justice and Social Action for the Methodist Church and served as the elected Vice-President of the Methodist Conference in Britain between 2016-17.

Rachel has also spent over a decade working for the Gambling Commission, seeking to regulate the industry to prevent gambling harm, and received an MBE for services to gambling regulation. She is a trustee of the youth work charity, Worth Unlimited, and Chair of Governors at an east London secondary school. She lives in Walthamstow, east London, where she spends much of her time trying, and failing, to keep up with the rest of her cycling-mad family.

**Right Reverend Nick Holtam**. He served as Bishop of Salisbury from 2011 until his retirement in 2021.

Nicholas Holtam was ordained deacon in the Church of England in 1979 to a curacy at St Dunstan's Stepney and retired from stipendiary ministry in 2021 as Bishop of Salisbury and the Church of England's lead bishop on the environment. In between he taught Ethics and Mission at Lincoln Theological College and was the vicar of two parishes – the Isle of Dogs in East London and St Martin-in-the-Fields, Trafalgar Square, where he was a regular broadcaster of worship, mostly on BBC Radio 4 and the World Service. He has therefore preached in a wide variety of contexts and will talk about the purpose and context of preaching, drawing on a variety of examples and issues from his experience.
