Circuit Letter 9.10.24 Revd. Shaun Sanders

Dear Wey Valley Circuit

It might seem obvious, but I hadn't quite twigged that Weybridge was built around a bridge on the River Wey. (Indeed, when I was a boy and heard Weybridge mentioned on the TV or radio, I thought they were referring to Wadebridge in Cornwall, but that's another story.)

If I'm honest, I hadn't really heard of the River Wey until I got to know the Wey Valley Methodist Circuit. Now I've moved to the Circuit, I've enjoyed some walks around this beautiful area. Most recently, I walked along the River Thames path from Walton to the River Wey at Weybridge and ended up at Byfleet and New Haw railway station, where I caught the train home. Along the way, I saw riverboats, locks, wildlife and bridges – including the oldest surviving bridge at Weybridge built in 1865 (pictured from my walk).



Rivers and seas were once an important means of travel and the reason why many settlements developed around the Thames and the Wey. My daily Bible readings have recently taken me through the book of Acts. It portrays the journeys of the Early Church, especially the journeys of St Paul as the mission of the Church reached out beyond its origins to the wider Roman world. Many of the journeys in Acts were made by sea, sometimes in the face of fearsome storms. Paul ended up in Malta following a shipwreck.

Early Methodism was very much a missionary movement built upon the quarter of a million miles travelled by John Wesley, especially on horseback. Before the spark of his conversion experience on 24th May 1738, he had been deeply moved by the faith of a group of Moravians during a lifethreatening storm on a sea journey across the Atlantic, to north America.

In the decades since John Wesley, transport has changed. The railways have come to our area with stations on the southern sides of Walton and Weybridge. The roads are busier than ever. A newer bridge at Weybridge was built in 1945 which now carries the main road traffic in from the M25, often making the roads in Weybridge quite congested (pictured). I use the A3 to drive to the southern part of the



Circuit rather than a boat on the River Wey (although I'm sure that would be good fun). Many routes for walkers have improved in recent years with the Thames Path officially opened in 1996.

We might not travel the same distance as John Wesley (at least not on horseback) or cover the same areas at St Paul, but we are called to be missionary churches, to reach out beyond what we are used to. By reaching out in partnership to those outside the church, to other communities, to groups who use our premises, we build bridges in the Wey Valley.


