Circuit Letter 26.02.25 Revd. Peter Hills

Dear Friends,

I think there can be no doubt that the world we live in is a Time of Trouble. OK, I pinched that phrase from the historian Arnold Toynbee, but it is no less true. Toynbee goes on to say, 'To the faint-hearted, a Time of Trouble is the epilogue of what has gone before it. To the [person] of faith, a Time of Trouble is the prelude to what is to follow.' Again, I lay no claim to having found that for myself. Toynbee was being quoted by the late Harry Williams when he was Provost of Coventry Cathedral, in an address in Germany in 1961, entitled 'Coventry, A Symbol of Reconciliation'. Williams went on to say, 'It remains a terrifying thing that history today is being moulded around prejudices which are rooted in events in the past, and not around hopes which are inspired by the vision of the future.'

I found these comments while preparing for a sermon on forgiveness last Sunday, though didn't use them then. Here are two more quotes: from the American scholar and preacher Walter Brueggemann: 'When we live according to our fears and our hates, our lives become very small and defensive, lacking the deep, joyous generosity of God.' And, from the late John Ferguson of the United Reformed Church, 'She buried the hatchet, but every week and sometimes twice a week, she laid flowers on its grave.'

We in the Church do better, don't we? Or do we? The truth is that church people like to look back, for the familiar is comforting. It took a long time to move on from the King James version of the Bible, and some never have. Nothing wrong in that. We hung on to 'thee's' and 'thou's' in our prayers for as long as we could, and sometimes still do. Not that I can talk, in my cassock, originating in the ancient tunic of the barbarian in ancient Roman times and my 18th century bands at the neck, not to mention my love of liturgy and Charles Wesley hymns. Nor is looking back a bad thing in itself. There are some things we should never forget: this year we remember Auschwitz, Dresden, Hiroshima and Nagasaki, all within my lifetime. Yet we see echoes of that history so soon after, in today's wars, in the movement of rootless people looking for a home, in the abuse of vulnerable people, particularly women and children, in the condemnation of others, just because of who they are, or what they think.

In his address to his former enemies, only 16 years after the Second World War, Harry Williams said, 'Only God can wipe out the past, and that is what forgiveness means.' I believe he had a point when he contrasted those who work to remember the past, 'and to see in the future nothing, apart from an opportunity to redress the past'; and those – and I hope we are among them – who live in the light of God's future.

A prayer by Percy Dearmer (1867-1936:

O God, who set before us the great hope that your kingdom shall come on earth and taught us to pray for its coming; give us grace to discern the signs of its dawning and to work for the perfect day when the whole world shall reflect your glory; through Jesus Christ our Lord.
