


# The Wey Valley Methodist Circuit

# A Message From Our Superintendent

#### Plans...

I know that there are some Methodists who make a habit of collecting and studying preaching plans. They are a real source of historic information and interest.

I also know that there are some of you who pore over the plan when it arrives in your inbox. Who is coming to share worship with you? What's happening on special Sundays? And, increasingly important, how many LAs (Local Arrangements) do we have this quarter?

The Preaching Plan is the responsibility of the superintendent minister. It's one of those 'buck stops here' kind of jobs. Most Sundays there are 13 slots to fill with five ministers, some lovely supernumerary ministers and some very willing and extremely gifted local preachers.

What happens most quarters is that Lucy and I sit in the office for three or four hours doing a first draft of the Plan and at the end of the morning we are usually left with a whole range of gaps that we cannot fill. We then send out a series of more or less pleading emails asking if anyone can offer any more Sundays and we cast the net as wide as we can to see if there are others who might help us (most of you will have noticed we have some very welcome help from Anglican friends in the June-August quarter). We then spend another couple of hours filling some of the gaps and trying our best to make things as equal as possible across the circuit. At some point we have to accept we have done all that we can do and the Plan goes to press. That...of course, is not the end of the story and the Plan on the website is very much a 'live' document with changes being made fairly regularly.

Some churches are happy to have local arrangements - it gives them an opportunity to produce some worship with a more local, 'home grown' flavour. Other churches are not so fond of those two letters - LA. There is help available - 'The Vine' online is a good example of a widely used resource.

The numbers of LAs have risen over the past couple of years (although I was looking at the Preaching Plan of the Aire and Calder Circuit recently and churches in that circuit are regularly dealing with five local arrangements each quarter).

As with so many things it depends on how radical we want to be in our solutions. There are churches in other circuits that have 'tweaked' the times of their morning services so that preachers can do one service and then move on to do another. There are others that are experimenting with 'live streamed' worship, some are moving service times to afternoons or evenings, some churches in this circuit are doing 'sectional' services once a quarter.

All of these actions reveal different ideas and attitudes towards worship; it's importance and who should lead it.

This quarter our local preachers are going to be talking about digital worship in all its forms. Is it a conversation your church could be having?

Superintendent's letter continued....

Worship is the lifeblood of any Christian. It is the 'worth' that we give to God. Who leads that and when, how, and where we do it are questions constantly worth pondering.

# **Cranleigh**


As I write this, we are bathed in glorious sunshine and enjoying the wonderful spring and early summer

At our recent faith group meeting, we agreed it had been a success and we plan to do it again next year. Our plans going forward now focus on Harvest, Remembrance and Carol services!

# **Godalming United Church**

### Looking back to Spring...

In February Eloise and Esther teamed up for a weekend away with the Methodist Youth Band at Lytham near Blackpool. Accommodation was on church-hall floors (fun when you're young!) and a great time was had by all – a packed concert on the Saturday evening and leadership of the Sunday morning service, all within the theme of "Created by the Creator: Created to Worship".

Also, in February we welcomed a surprise guest leading Sunday morning worship - Adam's excollege-buddy Revd. Andy Payton from the Methodist Temple, Evansville, Indiana – bringing us a refreshing transatlantic view of the Christian life. He packed in quite a "Methodist pilgrimage" during his week in Godalming: Wesley Chapel and Aldersgate Street in London, plus a visit to the New Room in Bristol – the first-ever purpose-built Methodist chapel, doubling up from the earliest days as a community-centre and base for the fight against slavery (at the time Bristol's biggest import).

Easter was marked by Messy Church featuring Sherlock Hemlock AKA Adam (complete with deerstalker and pipe) solving the mystery of "Who moved the stone?", a meditative journey through Holy Week on Palm Sunday with Sam, evening Maundy Communion in our own upper room, the towncentre Good Friday Witness, Easter morning Sunrise Service at Ladywell, and our own Sunday morning communion when we welcomed new members (a day chosen as especially appropriate by the early church).

In April, Ryan paid a visit to The Gambia, the highlight being the dedication of a Home-Science block at Gunjur Upper Basic School to his late, much-missed wife Sylvia – and a richly-deserved certificate of appreciation for his own ongoing contribution to aid to The Gambia.

In May, Messy Church "Trekked across the Desert with Abraham" and Muriel led us in a special Christian Aid service and lunch marking 80 years of Christian witness to the world's poorest people.

# **Guildford St Mary's**

If you have been following our journey at St Mary's, you will have seen that exhibitions feature strongly in our ministry. We're looking forward to hosting another exhibition of art from prisoners at HMP Send in September around Heritage Weekend (12-14 September) and to hosting a large part of the Methodist Modern Art Collection in Spring 2026 - watch this space.

The most recent exhibition has generated lots of interest both amongst worshippers and other visitors - a key difference is that it is a homegrown exhibition.

It was inspired by our series of Lent Reflections Finding Hope in Hard Places, a theme which resonates with many people at the moment. Members of the congregation were invited to select one of a range of photos illustrating some of life's hard places. The brief was to find a reading, poem or verses which for them offered hope or reassurance for people experiencing that place and to write a few lines explaining the reason for their choices. We had an enthusiastic take-up creating a stimulating exhibition of 19 pictures (see a selection below). The supporting readings were very varied, and some contributors went so far as to write their own poems.

A key feature for us has been that the inspiration for the choices came not from distinguished theologians but from ordinary Christians - people who worship together week by week. It's worth remembering that our individual life and faith experiences can offer invaluable reassurance, inspiration and testimony to others around us. The importance of us being ready to share such experiences was reinforced by another Lent course run in our parish where we were encouraged to be ready to tell our stories to help others on their faith journey.

Helpful in building our confidence in telling those stories, is improving our understanding of the beliefs we share in the church. 2025 is the 1,700th anniversary of the Nicene Creed – the first ecumenical statement of belief - and still at the core of our doctrine. Our next Practical Aspects of Spirituality will be looking at the Nicene Creed and asking why it still matters. Come along on Saturday morning 5 July 09.30-12.00 to find out more – refreshments served from 09.15.



# **What about Local Lay Pastors?**

Vocations and callings are as varied and unique as the individuals God has made – which is both a blessing and a challenge: a blessing because God calls people in so many different ways and places; a challenge because being Church means organising our structures in ways that enable people to fulfil those wide and varied callings.

I have the privilege of glimpsing into two very different, but equally valuable, vocations. One where lay people serve churches and their communities with pastoral care and leadership through the recently established Local Lay-Pastor office; the other where people respond to the needs of a wide range of people beyond gathered church spaces through chaplaincy.

'What's this new Local Lay-Pastor thing all about?' I hear you say. Well, it is not really new. The office might be, but the work of lay people serving church communities in such a way is as old as the Christian church itself – and, of course, lay people leading and providing pastoral care empowered the Methodist movement. All it took was someone to recognise the potential and organise the right structures to enable people to serve.

The new Local Lay-Pastor office follows in this same tradition. Our society has changed; the church is changing and our role as a Christian church is to discern what God is up to and support and help nurture it. A few years ago, the Methodist Conference recognised that across the connexion, increasing numbers of lay people were providing pastoral care in a significant way, that people were looking to them as their church leaders and that God was working through them to bring care and transformation. The Conference took the bold step to embrace this vocation and provide the structures needed to equip and enable it.

I have the joy of being part of implementing that bold step. There is nothing quite like sitting opposite someone who has been serving the church in such a way and saying, 'We recognise and value the ministry God has called you to. You are a Local Lay-Pastor and in the life of the church it is a really important calling.'

One of the questions I am asked most is, 'Well what does a Local Lay-Pastor actually do?' Again, this is as varied as the contexts people are called to. No two Local Lay-Pastors serve in the same way – the vocation arises out of the local circumstances in the way that God is calling people to join in with God's mission. Some are voluntary, some are employed, some work full time, some offer a few hours each week. The best way to find out is to speak to Local Lay-Pastors.

This is where the challenge lies – when we have an office that is as varied as the contexts people serve in, how do we organise ourselves to enable and equip them? We have done our best to create a framework for the Local Lay-Pastor office that recognises some of the common qualities and competencies needed to fulfil the role. The learning and development supports people in growing and nurturing their gifts and skills, so they can reflect on their practice and respond to the needs in their context. The office does not focus on creating people who can 'do' certain things but developing the characteristics that enable lay people to provide pastoral care and leadership in our communities.

# **Stoughton**

Our Maundy Thursday communion and Good Friday services were times of reflection followed by a joyful celebration on Easter Sunday morning, led by Revd. Claire Hargreaves and included the decoration of the Cross.

In 1890 the Methodist circuit of Guildford bought a plot of land on the corner of Grange Road and Stoughton Road and erected a corrugated iron-clad church room. The first meeting by a congregation calling themselves Wesleyan Methodists was on 21 February 1891. However, the Tin Tabernacle, as it became known, was soon found to be insufficient so funds were raised to build a permanent church. It was completed and opened in 1895 and in June we will celebrate 130 years of witness as the "Church on the Corner".

On Saturday 7 June at 7.30pm there will be a concert from the "Rhythm of Life Community Choir". We look forward to welcoming back our former minister Revd. Nick Holt on Sunday 8 June to lead our Anniversary service and this will be followed with a shared lunch.

Our Coffee Corner which began in May 2024 as fortnightly became weekly during the winter months and now, by popular demand(!), continues as a weekly event. 
