'Reaching for the stars'

I grew up in the 1950's and early 60's, when in the euphoria of post-war Britain everything seemed to be reaching upwards and outwards. These were the early years of space exploration, when hardly a week went by when we weren't hearing about spacecraft called 'Mercury', 'Vostok', 'Gemini', 'Voskhod' and so on. With many of my friends, I soared the heavens with space pilot of the future, Dan Dare, in *The Eagle* comic, as he fought the Mekon and the evil Treens from Venus. When I was about ten years old, a visit to the London Planetarium spurred a lifelong interest in astronomy, and my favourite hymn for the next few months was John Chadwick's:

Eternal ruler of the ceaseless round of circling planets singing on their way (MHB 892)

And in 1962 we were soon to be dancing to the futuristic number *Telstar* by the Tornados!



There are also very hazy memories (probably dating from when I was five or six) of seeing the mighty Bristol Brabazon at Farnborough – the largest airliner in the world at the time but deeply flawed, because it was too slow and about to be rendered obsolete by the new jets that were shortly to appear. Like humanity as a whole, in a way – a noble failure. I

suppose humanity has *always* been 'reaching for the stars', as it were, though there have been times in history when that has seemed more obvious.

The flowering of the arts in the period we now call the Renaissance, is an example. When Joan and I were in Paris some years ago, we stood transfixed before the sculpture of Auguste Rodin's the Kiss in the Musée Rodin. So one has to ask, how can we be capable of creating things of such beauty and machines of such ingenuity, and yet be equally capable of creating such suffering and destruction? The recent horrific pictures of the wasteland that is now Gaza, are just one instance of the latter.

We are creatures of contradiction, aren't we? I've just finished reading Jonathan Glancey's wonderful book *Spitfire*. How paradoxical was it that such an efficient killing-machine, could also be one of the most beautiful aeroplanes that ever flew the skies! Or to give another example (knowing my lifelong




interest in modern naval history) – H.M.S. Hood was perhaps the most



aesthetically pleasing of any warship in the last century, yet intended to wreak terrible destruction with her 15" guns. And, ironically, far from being scrapped or placed in a maritime museum, she met her end violently, with just three survivors out of a complement of over 1400 souls.

Forgive the 'travelogue', but there is a sculpture which – for me – encapsulates this paradox of the human condition. Joan and I were walking around Prague in 2005, and quite by chance came across the *Memorial to the Victims of Communism* by Czech sculptors Olbram Zoubek, Jan Kerel and Zdeněk Holzel (see below). It's in Újezd Street, if you are ever there.





Leaving political considerations aside for the moment, the extraordinary thing about these figures is that they can be viewed in two completely different ways. Are the sculptors intending us to see the figures being pulled back

up the slope, slowly disintegrating as their suffering wears them away to nothing? Or are we meant to see the figures gradually staggering forwards, and becoming more whole as the passage of time heals them?

How can we be capable of creating such beauty and yet such ugliness in our world? Or to put it another way, how can we have such uplifting visions, yet such horrible nightmares?

John Wesley's writing can be a huge help in this respect. When he talked about humanity's fallen state, he did so in a way that gives us immense grounds for hope. We are created in the image of God, and though the image has become distorted by our self-will and sin, it is not been shattered beyond repair. In Christ, we are shown the way to 'pardon, and holiness, and heaven', to quote his younger brother's words. Yes, we may stumble, but our Saviour extends his hand to help us, and we need not fear.

Looking at those pictures of the Czech sculpture above, which interpretation do you prefer? I know that I'm an incurable optimist, but it is based on a hope backed up by solid theology, and I think the figures are marching *forward*. Yes – by God's grace, we *can* reach for the stars!

Loving God, forgive us for the ugliness and suffering we cause and create in our world. Help us always to follow faithfully in the footsteps of our Lord Jesus Christ, who was humanity as it is meant to be – and in so doing, may we create beauty, harmony and peace in our living. Amen.

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
