#### **Response to the readings**

In this week's passage, Mary comes face to face with the unexpected. In her grief, she goes to see the tomb where Jesus is laid, only to discover that the tomb is empty! As she turns around, what does she see but angels, which must have been quite a surprise. Finally, she comes face to face with Jesus himself, the last person she expected to see. She's so surprised she doesn't even recognise him, and mistakes him for the gardener. On this Easter morning, Mary encounters the unexpected – and her life is changed because of it. She becomes a messenger of the good news, sent away to share with the disciples that Jesus' death was not the end.

Every Easter morning, we remember Mary's encounter with the unexpected, and we too are invited to rejoice with her that Jesus' death is not the end. We can celebrate that in the unexpected, we find new life. Thanks to Jesus resurrection, what we might see as over is not always the end.

Our invitation to you this Easter is to ask: where might I see the unexpected around me?

You're invited to set aside an hour this week to walk around your community. So often, the people and places around us become part of the routine, the expected, perhaps even the mundane. As we pass from place to place, they even blur into the background. We can be quick to write off parts of our community as a dead end, unable to be brought back to life.

Today, you are invited to come face to face with the unexpected in your community, and look for signs of new life.

Our communities have faced a lot over the past few years. Covid has reshaped our neighbourhoods, showing us who is working hard on the frontline and where we can find friendship and support in times of need. Today, many communities are facing the consequences of rising costs of living – although lots of this is happening behind closed doors. Foodbanks are busier as families are feeling their budget squeezed, and local businesses are worrying about the months ahead. This is a time to look out for new life in the unexpected. Where can we find encouragement in resilience? Where do we see gifts and skills ready to be put to use? Where might we come face to face with Jesus, and not even notice?

#### How to get started...

- Find a friend. We recommend that you walk around your neighborhood in pairs. We're not always able to spot the unexpected by ourselves. Walking and talking with another can help us see more than we can alone. If you're with your family, why not go together? This is a good activity to do with children, who can surprise us by seeing things we've never noticed.
- Find your starting point and ending point. It might help to have a sense of where you want to begin and end. This might be your home, the local park, or the high street. We'd suggest that you don't plan your route too closely – be open to taking different paths, and perhaps stumbling across something new (If you'd feel safer knowing where you are, perhaps take a map with you).
- **Pray.** As you begin, ask God to open up your head, heart and sight, that you might be open to the unexpected.
- Listen. Let's use all of our senses here, remembering to listen out for unexpected conversations or sounds. Listen too, for your name being called. In the garden, Jesus calls Mary by her name, and it is in this moment where she recognises him. Where might Jesus be calling your name, inviting you to open yourself up to the unexpected?
- Ask. Where can I be good news? Mary is given the gift of good news to carry back to the community around her. What have you seen that you can carry back with you, to bring good news to the people in your neighborhood? Perhaps this is encouragement, invitation or challenge, for your church or neighbours.
- **Share.** Are there opportunities to share your reflections in your local church, perhaps in a small group or in worship? Think about who you might be able to carry your good news to.

There is so much to learn when we start right where we are, and open ourselves up to the unexpected. This Easter, may you be blessed with the surprise of Mary, and the gift of good news to carry home.
