## Response to the reading

What happens if we abandon our traditional interpretation of today's gospel reading and have another go?

The traditional interpretation hinges on one assumption, for which I can see no clear evidence in the passage: that the master / giver of gold is somehow meant to represent God. But is that really true? Jesus never seems to say so. Do we really believe in a God who would give more gold to people who were more talented already, or who would say 'to those who already have, more shall be given... and to those who have little, what little they have will be taken away'. This certainly doesn't seem to match with the image of the Kingdom of God that Jesus paints elsewhere in the gospels.

What if this is not a story about how we should use what we have wisely (an interpretation that is helped by the confusing translation issue that the currency in this story is translated 'talents', the same word as we use for gifts/skills). What if, rather, it's a story about how unfair the world is and how many of us will be cast out by the system if we stand up to greed, or are unwilling to line the pockets of the wealthy with our hard work? Suddenly it becomes quite a different reading.

Here, we see the Master as a sort of archetypal capitalist overlord – someone who has plenty of wealth to spare, but only really wishes to use it to generate more.

Of course, he does rather well out of the whole affair, his investments double in the two larger of the three businesses. But the third appears to function more as a nonprofit, or a social enterprise company. This third investment does not grow. The third businessman appears to operate counter to the system of greed and wealth creation.

Of course, in the capitalist market-economy of the story, the investor is bitterly disappointed. The counter-narrative offered by this third business doesn't help him get any richer, so he throws him out.

But is the Kingdom of God a capitalist market-economy? Is the master an investor?

As we head towards Christmas and Advent, it strikes me every year that the incarnation of God, the birth of Christ, breaks all the assumptions that people have about what that might look like. The Kingdom of God comes near, and hardly anyone even notices...

We are the people of the counter-narrative. The Jesus-stories are about a man who resisted the status quo and built a movement based around love, self-sacrifice, justice and peace. How are we building that counter-narrative today?

Lord, forgive me for the times when my head is turned by the world's agenda, by money and wealth. Show me how to stay focused on your Kingdom. Ponder these two questions in the quiet for a few moments, perhaps taking notes and then find a way to discuss your answers and reflections in the week.

- How does the 'alternative' reading of this famous story from Matthew 25 make you feel? Have you heard it before? Is it helpful, or not really?

- Are there other places or stories in the Bible where there could be an 'alternative sermon' to the traditional messages we draw out? See if you can make a list of 3 or 4 stories and how they could be looked at a different way...

- If you can, go on a prayer walk. Or ask someone to help you make a journey around your neighbourhood – just the few houses near you would be fine, or go on a longer trip if you'd like to take in a whole estate or community.
- As you travel past each house, pray for the people who live there – just in your mind, or under your breath. Hold their situations, whether you know them or not, in your heart.

### Thursday 23<sup>rd</sup> November

- As you travel through this day, look out for Christmas lights and pray that people might experience something of the light of Christ in their lives this day and over this season.

### Friday 24<sup>th</sup> November

God is everywhere, if only you could be still enough to notice.  
Today, your challenge is to notice.  
Look for God in the sunrise, the birdsong, the taste of pizza, the comfort of your sofa, the embrace of a loved one, a text message that makes you smile...whatever it is. Notice.

### Saturday 25<sup>th</sup> November

- God my father and God my mother,  
God my big sister and God my little brother,  
God my best friend and God my Creator,  
I open myself up to encounter you again this weekend.  
Move in my life, open my eyes and heart,
