## Response to the reading

This week's passages remind us that God offers each of us an invitation – an invitation into eternal life. In the Gospel reading, we hear that this invitation is set before everyone, that they might choose to live differently and not to perish as those around them do. Instead, if they live differently they can bear fruit, like the fig tree in the parable. And, as the gardener in the parable is patient with the fig tree, God is patient with us. When the tree is not showing signs of the purpose for which it is planted, the gardener implores the owner not just to wait for the tree, but to surround it with the things it needs to thrive. With the right conditions and enough time, he is confident that it will blossom and fulfil its potential.

What does it look like for us to choose eternal life? What are the things we need around us, that in time we might bear the fruit of our faithfulness and trust in God? Perhaps for us, by surrounding ourselves with relationships which show us more of who God is, we might begin to bear fruit. We can open ourselves up to encountering God in the stranger, choosing to see life instead of danger in the world around us. And, as we see God in the stranger, we can take action, responding to the needs of others. By opening ourselves up, we have the opportunity to bear the fruit of God's love and faithfulness, as we show it to one another.

Around the world, millions of people are displaced from their homes. In Ukraine, over 4 million people are at risk of displacement because of the tragic conflict. In Afghanistan, the humanitarian crisis that has been raging for almost a year is leaving many people desperate and without resources. Whilst sometimes these crises can feel far away, we still have the opportunity to not just observe, but to respond, and to bear the fruit of God's love.<sup>2</sup>

Instead of offering welcome, the government are proposing we close the door on people who have a legitimate claim for sanctuary.

## Thursday 24th March

#### Friday 25th March

Today, why not pray for leaders and politicians around the world.

It might help you to write down some names of people in leadership, and then to spend some time praying for anything you know about them, their lives and the challenges they face. It could be local councillors, Members of Parliament, world leaders or other figures in positions of power, who need to remember the way of grace.

#### Saturday 26th March

This weekend, look for opportunities to pray as part of your normal, everyday life. When you are walking, could you pray that God will guide your footsteps for the next steps in your walk of discipleship.

When you are washing up, you could pray that God will clean out the areas of your life that feel wrong and messed up.

When you are reading emails, you could pray for each of the people who have emailed you, and pray about your responses.

When you are watching TV, at the end of a programme, turn the TV off for a few minutes before moving on to the next thing, and think about any prompts from the programme you've just watched that might be encouraging you to pray. (For example, if it was a police drama, you might choose to pray for the police and all working to bring safety to our society).
